 25 contracts, procedures streamlined, Local Finance

 2 MR. ANTUN: Mr. Chairman, the next  
 3 item that I have is recommending an amendment to the  
 4 Purchasing Agent's Awards. It is Item 11B. We  
 5 would request that the Board make a motion to remove  
 6 this item from the agenda. The reason being is that  
 7 we received information from another bidder  
 8 challenging the credentials of the vendor that was  
 9 recommended, and the Law Department needs time to  
 10 evaluate this matter.  
 11 THE CLERK: Mr. Chairman, it would be

 13 being distributed now.  
 14 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: It's B?

 19 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: What was the  
 20 objection?  
 21 MR. ANTUN: The objection that was  
 22 raised by one of the bidders is the company does  
 23 not -- is not authorized by the manufacturer to  
 24 install and maintain the equipment.  
 25 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: It sounds like the

 2 MR. BATTISTA: I think the issue is  
 3 they are not qualified by the manufacturer when they  
 4 install for the warranty.  
 5 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: That's the same  
 6 issue as C. Mr. Administrator, on 11C, isn't the  
 7 issues that you have on that is that bidder has to  
 8 have an ample number of qualified individuals  
 9 qualified by the manufacturer working for them  
 10 because if they don't and a non-qualified individual  
 11 works on the HVAC, then the warranty wouldn't be  
 12 able to go forth?  
 13 MR. BATTISTA: That's correct.  
 14 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: Sound like the  
 15 same thing to me.  
 16 MR. BATTISTA: It may be the same  
 17 church, but it's a different pew.  
 18 MR. ANTUN: I'm not finished. Okay.  
 19 Again, since you happened to mention it, Freeholder,  
 20 we received a letter, and we were provided with a  
 21 memo from County Counsel that addresses this issue.  
 22 We will distribute.  
 23 MR. BATTISTA: What you're receiving  
 24 is a memorandum obviously from Assistant County  
 25 Counsel. It is my understand, and the Purchasing

1 Agent is here, is that the bid specifications  
 2 required each bidder to have at least four employees  
 3 who were qualified to perform work on different  
 4 particular equipment. The bidder who was deemed  
 5 nonresponsive did not have the requisite number of  
 6 employees who are trained in specific areas that  
 7 were requested in the bids. The bidder who was  
 8 rejected requested a hearing. The issue is whether  
 9 the bidder is entitled to a hearing.  
 10 It's our opinion that when a bidder is  
 11 rejected because the bid not responsive to the  
 12 specifications, the bidder is not entitled to a  
 13 hearing. If the bidder has been rejected because we  
 14 deemed the bidder a non-responsible bidder, which  
 15 from a legal standpoint is different than being a  
 16 non-responsive bidder, the bidder may have an  
 17 argument that they are entitled to a hearing.  
 18 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: So our counsel  
 19 reviewed that memorandum?  
 20 MR. BATTISTA: Yes, I just got it.  
 21 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: I'm going to make  
 22 a motion that we carry 11C to the next meeting. Do  
 23 you need us to do the resolution?  
 24 MR. ANTUN: Let me have Director  
 25 Demellier address that in terms of how much money.

1 THE CLERK: Mr. Chair, the new Item  
 2 11, which was distributed, which does not have a  
 3 sponsor, includes two items. It is including the  
 4 HVAA/HVAC system bid. Is it sponsorship of a new 11  
 5 and move to amend it?  
 6 MR. BATTISTA: It's already on the  
 7 agenda. It's been put on for the purposes of the  
 8 Consent Agenda.  
 9 THE CLERK: Yes, with A, B and C on  
 10 it, so it's an amendment to the existing by deleting  
 11 B and C.  
 12 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: Okay. I'm going  
 13 to make a motion to amend Item 11 to remove B and to  
 14 carry C until the next meeting. I just want to ask  
 15 our counsel, I just want to ask our counsel to  
 16 review the memorandum and provide her opinion to us,  
 17 and then I would also ask, Mr. Administrator, if you  
 18 could provide all of us a copy of the specs. I mean  
 19 we discussed it in committee.  
 20 You know, on the face of it, Director  
 21 Demellier's argument which the same argument I think  
 22 you made seems to make logical sense, but I would  
 23 rather take a little time, try not to be litigated  
 24 if at all possible, especially when it involves a  
 25 Hudson County firm, but for that issue would have

1 been the low bidder.  
 2 MR. BATTISTA: The gist of the  
 3 problem is that the specifications required a  
 4 successful bidder to have the number of employees,  
 5 specific number of employees, who possess certain  
 6 certification. This bidder did not do it, did not  
 7 have it. I think the bidder's challenge is probably  
 8 to the specifications as to whether or not that was  
 9 reasonable, but those were what the specifications  
 10 are. To encumber the specification to me would have  
 11 given this bidder an advantage. I have no problem.  
 12 FREEHOLDER MUNOZ: The other question  
 13 would be, why don't we do this: In the County we  
 14 have mechanics. Why don't we use them in areas that  
 15 we contract with another organization?  
 16 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: I can't answer  
 17 that, but the logic that was presented to us was  
 18 this: In order for the warranty on the HVAC system  
 19 to be enforced, the entity who we purchased the HVAC  
 20 system from requires that any maintenance or repair  
 21 work be done by people that they certified, go  
 22 through specific -- you can correct me if I'm wrong.  
 23 DIRECTOR DEMELLIER: That is one, one  
 24 part of the issue.  
 25 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: So the argument

Page 17

1 was that because theoretically at any time, multiple  
 2 systems could go down where you needed to have -- I  
 3 thought it was six, now they're telling me it's  
 4 four, that have that certification as a technician.  
 5 It seemed on its face seems logical, the issue as to  
 6 whether they have to be an employee or you can have  
 7 some other contractual relationship. I don't know  
 8 all the details of that. I guess that's something  
 9 we can look at in the next two weeks. Part of what  
 10 I recollect from the committee meeting was they  
 11 attempted to ascertain if that was the case with  
 12 some people.  
 13 DIRECTOR DEMELLIER: The wording in  
 14 the specs is for the certified technicians. That's  
 15 the exact wording. The reference for employee is  
 16 written down in the specs, talking about only  
 17 assigning it an employee that has a certification.  
 18 I'm not getting into that. That's the legal side of  
 19 it.  
 20 The reason for having certified  
 21 technicians, who are certified technicians, the  
 22 system County-wide is over 45,000 tons, and the  
 23 majority of tonnage is manufactured by York. You  
 24 have to have people that know how work on chillers  
 25 and things with the manufacturer. The systems are

Page 18

1 just too important to go down. We can't have them  
 2 down so we can't take chances on people that are  
 3 uncertified. For eight years or at least eight  
 4 years in the specifications for this contract it  
 5 asked for the same certification as this time.  
 6 This particular company who had the  
 7 contract the last two years, their system is not a  
 8 long-term contractor. They only won this contract  
 9 through a bidding process two years ago. The prior  
 10 firm was Carrier, so this isn't a longstanding  
 11 contractor. Other than the fact that their work was  
 12 considered satisfactory, it's not a longstanding  
 13 contractor. The issue becomes whether, you know, a  
 14 company, any company bidding, could provide those  
 15 certified technicians. That's the issue that  
 16 becomes the legal.  
 17 FREEHOLDER MUNOZ: So this company  
 18 bid. So the Purchasing Agent of the County sent it  
 19 back saying they didn't bid right, what happened?  
 20 MR. BATTISTA: What I understand the  
 21 Purchasing Agent did correctly, when the bids came  
 22 in, the bidder did not have the requisite  
 23 certifications. I believe the Purchasing Agent gave  
 24 the bidder an opportunity to show us that they had  
 25 the employees who possess the requisite

Page 19

1 certifications. After giving the bidder the  
 2 opportunity to do that, the bidder could not produce  
 3 it. Consequently, the bidder did not meet what was  
 4 required by the terms and specifications, and the  
 5 argument about whether they had someone under the  
 6 contract or they had employees is really a moot  
 7 issue because they didn't show us that they had four  
 8 people that was required by the terms.  
 9 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: It would be good  
 10 if that's what happened, but that's not quite what  
 11 happened. What happened was you actually listed the  
 12 other company originally at one point to award the  
 13 bid to, remember that, Mr. Administrator, isn't that  
 14 correct? So your Purchasing Department listed to  
 15 award the bid to Inline.  
 16 Then what happened is the current vendor  
 17 who came in fourth place filed a letter with the  
 18 Purchasing Agent that basically said, Hey, this  
 19 company doesn't have the certified individuals to do  
 20 the job. The reality of it, let's be quite honest,  
 21 is the Purchasing Agency never did the job of  
 22 verifying whether or not this vendor has the  
 23 certified personnel, isn't that correct,  
 24 Mr. Administrator, prior to an objection being filed  
 25 by another vendor?

1 MR. ANTUN: As far as -- I don't  
 2 know. She would have to speak to that. Normally,  
 3 what happens, Freeholder, is that these bids are  
 4 sent out to the department. I think the Purchasing  
 5 Agent relies on the department to review them.  
 6 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: Whether it was the  
 7 department or Purchasing, no one, no one undertook  
 8 that process until a written objection was filed.  
 9 MR. ANTUN: That's correct. That's  
 10 correct.  
 11 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: By the current  
 12 vendor who came in fourth in the bid.  
 13 MR. ANTUN: That's correct.  
 14 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: And but for that  
 15 person filing it, we would have, let's be honest,  
 16 awarded the bid to Inline a few weeks ago.  
 17 DIRECTOR DEMELLIER: That's  
 18 absolutely true, but it's also not unusual.  
 19 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: I'm not disputing  
 20 it's not unusual. That's why I need more time to  
 21 read the specs. I don't feel like approving the  
 22 fourth bidder after we get a letter, find out we're  
 23 in court, have us fight over what a bid spec said or  
 24 didn't say. It may not be employees, you know. I  
 25 understand that you're saying they didn't

Page 21

1 demonstrate that they had them. They go on and say,  
 2 they're not our employees, but we have some kind of,  
 3 some contractual relationship, and the Court says,  
 4 what's the difference between this, that and the  
 5 other thing.  
 6 I just want to understand the spec before  
 7 we do this. I don't know what the harm is in  
 8 waiting a couple of weeks, being that the firm is a  
 9 Hudson County company. I would rather take a little  
 10 more time and get all the information.  
 11 DIRECTOR DEMELLIER: No, the  
 12 department isn't pressing to move it. I mean I came  
 13 up to microphone to answer the questions which were  
 14 to address moving forward the funds being available.  
 15 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: The difference is  
 16 the hourly rate between them.  
 17 DIRECTOR DEMELLIER: Actually, it was  
 18 only two because the two perspective bidders were  
 19 not qualified. They were not responsive. They had  
 20 no certification. This isn't the only firm that had  
 21 certification problems. Two other firms, and I  
 22 don't remember their names, had the same problem.  
 23 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: What was the  
 24 difference?  
 25 DIRECTOR DEMELLIER: It was -- it was

Page 22

1 \$14 an hour maybe.

2 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Freeholder Cifelli.

3 FREEHOLDER CIFELLI: It seems to me

4 that we have multiple contracts where multiple specs

5 were provided. The fourth vendor has certain people

6 on staff, whether it's this contract or an elevator

7 contract, whatever the contract would be. Do we

8 have a standard provision in our specs that those

9 firms have workers or technicians that have to be

10 regular employees, or that says, no, as long as you

11 can prove that you have those people under contract?

12 Do we have a set policy and procedure, or is that

13 just something that's just haphazardly done in the

14 contract?

15 DIRECTOR DEMELLIER: I would say it's

16 not haphazardly done. Off the top of my head, I

17 couldn't say that all contracts had the same wording

18 with regard to that issue. I can say this contract

19 asked for four certified technicians, did not say in

20 that paragraph use the word "employee." It did not.

21 It said four certified technicians.

22 FREEHOLDER CIFELLI: The other

23 questions, is it possible that to be a successful

24 vendor bidder, irrespective of whether it says

25 employee, it says you have to have four technicians,

Page 23

1 do the vendors have to prove in the bid that they

2 have those people as employees or they have them

3 under contract, or is it simply a catch-all?

4 DIRECTOR DEMELLIER: It says you

5 had to show four certified technicians at the time

6 of the bid. You had to show it because we can't,

7 and this isn't from a legal standpoint, we can't

8 afford to let people do that because you could wind

9 up with a storefront operation that's just a broker

10 and just gets a contract and goes out after the

11 fact. It says that you have to show that you have

12 four certified technicians at the time you submit

13 the bid.

14 FREEHOLDER CIFELLI: How do they do

15 that? They gave you a list of names?

16 DIRECTOR DEMELLIER: They give you

17 names and certifications.

18 FREEHOLDER CIFELLI: So then how are

19 we getting this because the names --

20 DIRECTOR DEMELLIER: Because what

21 happened was the names, initially there weren't

22 enough names, and when it was cured, there was.

23 There was a time allowed for curing. What happened

24 at that point is these people were employees of

25 another firm, who probably because of the fourth

Page 24

1 bidder contacted the County and said that this

2 company was not authorized to use their employees.

3 FREEHOLDER CIFELLI: What happened

4 was you have to prove that you have the techs. It

5 does have to be qualified. So I would assume that

6 we got that with the bid, so how do we not know?

7 DIRECTOR DEMELLIER: We don't as a

8 rule. When people submit certifications with the

9 names, the assumption is because of the document

10 they have to sign when they submit the bid, that

11 they're real.

12 FREEHOLDER CIFELLI: Do they have to

13 as the other people assuming are licensed, do they

14 attach something, a copy of a professional license

15 or certification?

16 DIRECTOR DEMELLIER: Yes, the copy.

17 It's that they weren't employees.

18 FREEHOLDER CIFELLI: This particular

19 spec required it?

20 DIRECTOR DEMELLIER: It says in

21 another paragraph, it says that an employed

22 certified technician would be assigned to work on

23 the equipment.

24 FREEHOLDER CIFELLI: So a strict

25 definition of "employee," that's what's driving the

Page 25

1 bus?

2 DIRECTOR DEMELLIER: A successful

3 bidder must assign an employee who possesses a

4 certification to perform all maintenance, repairs,

5 et cetera.

6 MR. BATTISTA: I mean, Freeholder --

7 FREEHOLDER CIFELLI: If it said must

8 assign a technician, you wouldn't have this spec?

9 DIRECTOR DEMELLIER: Correct.

10 MR. BATTISTA: Freeholder, Director

11 can correct me, the issue isn't whether they were

12 contractors or employees. My understanding is that

13 the vendor did not produce the requisite number.

14 Whether they were employees or from the

15 subcontracting standpoint, we never had to get to

16 that issue. I was told the number of certified

17 people that were submitted did not meet the four.

18 FREEHOLDER CIFELLI: If that's the

19 case, this would have been an easy fix. They have

20 to provide the names and the certifications. Then

21 they dropped the ball.

22 MR. BATTISTA: I agree with you.

23 That should have been picked up when it was open.

24 The point is --

25 FREEHOLDER CIFELLI: So all it gives

Page 26

1 me is his name, and we'll pay for it.

2 MR. BATTISTA: I was never asked to

3 address that issue because it never got to that

4 point. Until they had four, that wasn't a question

5 that I had to answer.

6 DIRECTOR DEMELLIER: The question was

7 raised when the company that these certified

8 technicians are employees, protested. They are not

9 a vendor. They just protested. Why? Obviously,

10 some of them had an interest. I'm not going to get

11 into what goes on in the industry, but clearly it's

12 somebody looking at two companies in an industry,

13 one is very big; one is more regional than the

14 other. Who know what the reasons are?

15 That brought the issue to light. Whether

16 they were contracted or employed from a department

17 standpoint didn't matter. I would have given that

18 opinion at that point that as long as it was what it

19 was, if they were contracted, that's fine. If they

20 had an agreement, written agreement, that's fine. I

21 actually said that to a representative of the

22 company with the specs. That wasn't -- it turned

23 out not to be the case.

24 Then it became a legal issue. That's

25 where we are now. I might add there was also other

Page 27

1 certifications for the equipment that were never

2 presented either. So it wasn't just that issue.

3 There were issues right down the line with the other

4 equipment.

5 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Freeholder Rivera.

6 FREEHOLDER RIVERA: I think that

7 Billy put a motion to carry that over.

8 DIRECTOR DEMELLIER: I answered the

9 question. Can I answer the question on the money?

10 The Freeholder brought that up. That's initially

11 why I came up here. I actually repeated mostly what

12 was said before by different people. This contract

13 was extended 20 percent, so we can't really without

14 going through the State, the Comptroller, to go over

15 the 20 percent which would take more time and the

16 time between now and the next meeting, I can operate

17 and start the system so to speak. If I have a

18 problem, quite frankly, I can declare an emergency

19 to fix that problem. For the two weeks, I'm sure we

20 can operate without any negative impact.

21 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Freeholder Munoz.

22 FREEHOLDER MUNOZ: From the legal

23 standpoint, wouldn't it be better --

24 MR. BATTISTA: I'm sorry?

25 FREEHOLDER MUNOZ: Wouldn't it be

Page 28

1 better because of all the issues that we discussed

2 here to do the whole process again?

3 MR. BATTISTA: No. In order to

4 reject bids, the statute requires that we have to

5 establish one of the conditions to reject bids. I'm

6 not prepared to say whether or not this would fall

7 into it. The only way we can reject bids generally

8 is the bids we received substantially exceeded our

9 estimate, substantially exceeded our budget, whether

10 or not we were going to materially change the specs

11 or whether or not at the end of the project, whether

12 or not we feel the purposes of the public contract

13 were not being served.

14 We cannot just reject bids because we want

15 to do it over again. I mean that would create a

16 problem in terms -- again, I'm not looking to get

17 into a legal discussion, but then the bidder who is

18 being presented to you can very well sue.

19 DIRECTOR DEMELLIER: Mr. Chair, just

20 to clarify something I said before. This contract's

21 terms did not run out. The term of this contract is

22 sometime in 2014. It was the contract appropriation

23 ran out, which is why it was a problem in terms of

24 extending it 20 percent.

25 This is the type of contract you could be

Page 29

1 going along, spending almost nothing from it, and in

2 two months get close to blowing it out because I

3 wind up with major repairs. You don't have time

4 flexibility. That's why we extended the 20 percent.

5 It had nothing to do with the contract running out.

6 FREEHOLDER MUNOZ: The specs that we

7 have, I mean I'm pretty sure that other companies

8 have similar specs, similar air conditioners for the

9 municipalities?

10 DIRECTOR DEMELLIER: No, they're not

11 even close to what we have. We have 45,000 tons.

12 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: There is a motion

13 and a second.

14 THE CLERK: There's a motion on the

15 table on No. 11, as it appears on the agenda to

16 remove B and to carry C.

17 Freeholder Cifelli.

18 FREEHOLDER CIFELLI: Yes.

19 THE CLERK: DiDomenico.

20 FREEHOLDER DiDOMENICO: Yes.

21 THE CLERK: Dublin.

22 FREEHOLDER DUBLIN: Yes.

23 THE CLERK: Liggio.

24 FREEHOLDER LIGGIO: Yes.

25 THE CLERK: Munoz.

Page 30

1 FREEHOLDER MUNOZ: Yes.  
 2 THE CLERK: O'Dea.  
 3 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: Yes.  
 4 THE CLERK: Rivas.  
 5 FREEHOLDER RIVAS: Yes.  
 6 THE CLERK: Rivera.  
 7 FREEHOLDER RIVERA: Yes.  
 8 THE CLERK: Chairman Romano.  
 9 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Yes.  
 10 MR. ANTUN: Mr. Chairman, those are  
 11 all the agenda items, but I do have some additional  
 12 information. There is a memo from the County  
 13 Counsel. This was at the request of Freeholder  
 14 Dublin, I believe, regarding the Don't Block the Box  
 15 intersection, the memo that explains a response to  
 16 your question, Freeholder.  
 17 Next item that I have, Mr. Chairman, on  
 18 Tuesday there was extensive discussion regarding the  
 19 Lincoln Park West project regarding the filling of  
 20 the materials. There is a package that has been put  
 21 together in response to a request for information of  
 22 Freeholder O'Dea. That's what's being distributed  
 23 right now.  
 24 FREEHOLDER DUBLIN: On the third  
 25 paragraph, Don't Block the Box, there is something

1 there?  
 2 MR. BATTISTA: What I think it's  
 3 suggesting is that there is a statute that can be  
 4 used to accomplish the goals that you were seeking  
 5 to achieve. Any law enforcement officer can enforce  
 6 it. You can argue that even a citizen can probably  
 7 file a complaint.  
 8 FREEHOLDER DUBLIN: If you travel  
 9 opposite through Jersey City using the County roads  
 10 when there is traffic backed up there, then they  
 11 rush the intersection, you're stopped from going in  
 12 a different direction, and we need to address that.  
 13 MR. BATTISTA: The undersheriff is  
 14 here. Perhaps he will share his opinion.  
 15 UNDERSHERIFF CONTI: Yes, sir.  
 16 FREEHOLDER DUBLIN: You need to be  
 17 looking into blocking the box in Hudson County and  
 18 Jersey City. There's a lot of areas where traffic  
 19 jams occur. Instead of waiting until the traffic  
 20 moves, they will go and rush the box and prevent  
 21 other traffic from flowing in a different direction.  
 22 So I just think that we need to start enforcing the  
 23 ordinance. We need to start enforcing it,  
 24 especially on County roads because there is a major  
 25 problem, especially on Route 440, which I know is a

Page 32

1 State road, but we have a lot of issues down there  
 2 on 440 and County Road.  
 3 UNDERSHERIFF CONTI: Only thing I can  
 4 say is during the course of the day or night when we  
 5 have officers that are in certain areas, enforcement  
 6 is several statutes they can use. I'll bring it to  
 7 the attention of the patrol captain to put out the  
 8 word.  
 9 FREEHOLDER DUBLIN: We can send  
 10 something out to maybe the State. That's especially  
 11 in the morning and sometimes even when we're getting  
 12 the kids out of school.  
 13 UNDERSHERIFF CONTI: I will have to  
 14 send a letter to them.  
 15 FREEHOLDER DUBLIN: All right.  
 16 MR. ANTUN: Mr. Chairman, the last  
 17 item that I have, I met with Dr. Gabert and at his  
 18 staff yesterday, and I provide the Board with the  
 19 information that was provided to me regarding the  
 20 scholarship program. What was presented to me was a  
 21 recommendation that was put together between the  
 22 Freeholder committee that consisted of yourself,  
 23 Mr. Chairman, Dublin and DiDomenico and the college.  
 24 I provided the Board with the criteria and  
 25 with the application. Basically, it would be a

Page 33

1 scholarship fund would be created for more than 20  
 2 students with the tuition and books. The tuition  
 3 would be \$5,000 for each one. We would have to  
 4 appropriate \$100,000 on the budget for this program.  
 5 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: That would be  
 6 biannually, a two-year scholarship.  
 7 MR. ANTUN: That wasn't -- that's a  
 8 good point, Mr. Chairman. That wasn't discussed,  
 9 but yes, you would probably have to do it on a  
 10 biannual basis because obviously if a student, if  
 11 all 20 students complete the program, it takes them  
 12 two years to complete the program, so you can only  
 13 do it every other year.  
 14 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: What was the  
 15 determination as far as students broken down by so  
 16 many per town?  
 17 MR. ANTUN: It would be two per  
 18 Freeholder, and two for the County Executive.  
 19 That's how we got the 20, nine Freeholders and the  
 20 County Executive. So each Freeholder and the County  
 21 Executive would recommend two full-time students.  
 22 FREEHOLDER RIVAS: I think that  
 23 should be vetted differently. There's a lot of  
 24 students that apply for this.  
 25 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: I think the problem

Page 34

1 is the finance. How much would that cost?

2 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: Mr. Chairman, when

3 Tilo's predecessor, Brian Stack, was on this Board,

4 he worked at and I worked with him creating this

5 program. This program was modeled after other

6 counties. Union County was one of them. Union

7 County is not, Freeholder, pick two named and the

8 County Exec picks two names. We created a program

9 so everyone who met those requirements in the

10 program should be able to get an education. The

11 worst thing in the world we would want to do is turn

12 a Hudson scholar's program into some kind of a

13 political football.

14 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: You realize what we

15 had before? You realize that Hudson County

16 Community College wanted to give us a bill until

17 Freeholder Dublin and myself and Freeholder

18 DiDomenico met with them for a million dollars

19 because not one dime was accepted and then

20 reimbursed.

21 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: So, so you

22 understand, so if you're going to tell me that I'm

23 supposed to feel bad for the president of the Hudson

24 County College is so inept that he never notified us

25 for so many years that there was money that we owe,

Page 35

1 I think that I would take the president of the

2 college to task, not to task because we act on good

3 faith that we know and understand what it was, and

4 lest us not be foolish. We allocate money to that

5 college every year. You're sitting on the Board of

6 School Estimates for that college. We allocate

7 that. Were you notified of that?

8 Shame on the president of the college. So

9 don't make it look like, we didn't know he's trying

10 to hand us a bill for a million dollars. Years and

11 years have gone by and the guy hasn't said a word

12 about.

13 FREEHOLDER CIFELLI: We haven't

14 addressed the issue. The issue is not about our

15 relationship with the president of the college, and

16 how that's torture over the years as Freeholder

17 O'Dea I'm sure knows. We're here to talk about the

18 scholarship. Let's stay focused on the scholarship.

19 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: I'm going to stay

20 focused on the scholarship. We made a commitment as

21 a Board that we wanted to create a that program, and

22 we wanted to fund a program. Whatever we owe in the

23 past, that money is off. This is a real program,

24 not a program that's going to say, Bill O'Dea, send

25 30 people to my office and let me pick two. I'm

Page 36

1 never going to do that. I would rather spend

2 150,000 of our money so we could get young people

3 educated and get them a college degree.

4 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: I would like to

5 know why five years on this Board, I never knew we

6 had a chance to recommend anybody.

7 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: You never

8 recommend anyone. The program is not supposed to

9 work that way. The program that was set up was very

10 simple. You're a resident of the County, and you

11 can't afford it, but you meet certain academic

12 requirements and milestones. Then what happens is

13 the college is -- the college is supposed to exhaust

14 every other possibility from every other financial

15 aid scholarship that may be available outside of

16 this, and then after that, they're supposed to close

17 the gap in that package to offer the opportunity for

18 that individual to go to school.

19 What happened is and I'm going to leave

20 the president or anyone else, I'm not going lay

21 blame on any one individual. They haven't been

22 doing it. They haven't been letting us know what

23 that was or what that costs or how many individuals

24 there were. We haven't gotten an annual report for

25 years and years, but this is what we committed

Page 37

1 ourselves to.

2 If we want to change our commitment, then

3 put a resolution forward to change our commitment.

4 This Board made a commitment prior, you're correct,

5 prior to your tenure. Prior to Freeholder Rivas's

6 tenure, but to his credit and taking on the mantle

7 of the successor to Freeholder Stack, who we worked

8 with hand in hand in putting this program together,

9 looked at other counties that did it, created a very

10 simple program.

11 It's a poor urban County. We don't want

12 to deny young people the opportunity to get an

13 education. We created what it was. We created what

14 it was. We created how it works. We created a

15 process, and you're right. If I went back and

16 checked what they've done or haven't done, I'm going

17 to have Ed Florio write a report like about the

18 traffic.

19 Going forward we should be committed to

20 what we did. The idea of letting us to pick two

21 people is ridiculous. It's ridiculous. First of

22 all, that's assuming that we each had an equal

23 number of individuals in our district who meet a

24 low-income requirement for the program to begin

25 with. That's foolish. We had the whole argument

Page 38

1 about where crime stats and income areas with  
 2 Freeholder Dublin and I knowing that the income  
 3 levels of our district is substantially lower then  
 4 say your district, Freeholder Romano. The income  
 5 guidelines in your district are substantially higher  
 6 than mine.

7 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Not if you go by  
 8 Hoboken High School.

9 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: Not by Hoboken  
 10 High School, I'm talking about the population of  
 11 your town and the income level of your individuals  
 12 can go to any school.

13 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Freeholder Cifelli.  
 14 I want to make a comment because the meeting that we  
 15 were in, Freeholder Dublin wasn't even aware of what  
 16 was happening under him.

17 FREEHOLDER DUBLIN: I wasn't on the  
 18 Board when the scholarship fund was voted.

19 FREEHOLDER MUNOZ: How much money are  
 20 we spending on the inmates in Hudson County? How  
 21 much money are we spending on drug habitation all  
 22 this stuff? How much money are we spending on  
 23 welfare training? We say that we only have \$100,000  
 24 to give to the program. Then we should eliminate  
 25 all the other programs because this is more

Page 39

1 important than rehabilitation of inmates to give an  
 2 opportunity to young people to want to get an  
 3 opportunity to go to college.

4 I feel that we have to look for ways to  
 5 find more funding under this and create guidelines.  
 6 I don't think that we as Freeholders should get it  
 7 because it will become a political thing. I think  
 8 that the college, there should be some guidelines of  
 9 who should apply to it. We all should issue  
 10 recommendations, but it shouldn't be based on  
 11 Freeholder. I agree.

12 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Before Freeholder  
 13 Cifelli chimes in, that's the reason that we formed  
 14 the committee. There were no guideline. We were  
 15 told straight out there were no guidelines. There  
 16 is no academic criteria.

17 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: I'm going to tell  
 18 you, you were lied to, and I will get the  
 19 guidelines. I will go back, Mr. Clerk, Mr. Clerk,  
 20 go back into the archives. Go back to when this was  
 21 first brought up during one of my prior terms and  
 22 Freeholder Cifelli was here and Freeholder Liggio  
 23 was here and Freeholder Stack was here.

24 We set our criteria. We provided the  
 25 actual format that the other county followed, what

Page 40

1 the grades were. There's actually transcripts of  
 2 meetings where Dr. Gabert spoke about the process  
 3 that they would follow where they would verify the  
 4 incomes of the individuals, they would exhaust every  
 5 other programs or Pell grants or other grants.  
 6 Look, it's realistic that now the cost of this  
 7 program is going to be more because we know some of  
 8 those grants were cut. We understand that's  
 9 realistic.

10 The president at the school should be  
 11 coming here talking to us, not saying there is not  
 12 guidelines. There are guidelines. It worked for  
 13 the first couple years. We had 30, 40, 50. Now all  
 14 of a sudden somebody is coming and saying pick two,  
 15 everyone of you guys, pick two and the County  
 16 Executive two. No way. It's a ridiculous.

17 FREEHOLDER CIFELLI: Like Freeholder  
 18 O'Dea said, when this program started, there were  
 19 guidelines. We were not going to sit here in  
 20 judgment of the student's applications. We are not  
 21 qualified to do it. Quite frankly, I would not want  
 22 to. I wouldn't want that responsibility.

23 MR. ANTUN: Mr. Chairman, that's not  
 24 what it was. What was proposed, I'm talking about  
 25 what was proposed, is that the college would vet the

Page 41

1 application, but once the application has been  
 2 vetted, it would come to you. You would do the  
 3 selection.

4 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: That's a joke.

5 MR. ANTUN: Freeholder, this was what  
 6 I was told it was recommended by the Committee of  
 7 Board.

8 FREEHOLDER RIVERA: What committee?

9 MR. ANTUN: Romano, DiDomenico and  
 10 Dublin. That's what I was told when I met with him  
 11 yesterday.

12 FREEHOLDER DUBLIN: I was assigned to  
 13 the committee for the college. I don't sit on that  
 14 committee anymore.

15 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: I've never been on  
 16 that committee. I'm on the committee once every  
 17 nine years when I'm Chairman.

18 FREEHOLDER DUBLIN: We shouldn't sit  
 19 up here and put one entity against another entity.  
 20 It's the college's responsibility to because they're  
 21 the professionals as Freeholder said, to vet through  
 22 the system. I just think that what they're saying  
 23 is put them into some type of deficit, right, with  
 24 the program because of the amount of people who  
 25 applied for the Freeholder scholarship, and a lot of

Page 42

1 the recommendations are not being made by a  
 2 Freeholder. They're being made by other people in  
 3 other municipalities.  
 4 So I just think I agree with Bill. It has  
 5 to go somewhere. Someone has to sit down with the  
 6 college and find ways where we can keep the program  
 7 going. We may have to give them a little  
 8 assistance.  
 9 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: And I would say  
 10 this. We believe in the program. The program  
 11 started off. It worked relatively well for a couple  
 12 of years. We thought it was on autopilot.  
 13 Obviously it wasn't on autopilot. Obviously, there  
 14 is a million dollar bill that no one wanted to tell  
 15 us about. We just said that is past, that bill is  
 16 washed away.  
 17 The policy decision is simple. We made a  
 18 policy decision of the importance of trying to allow  
 19 low-income individuals who don't have the financial  
 20 ability to afford to go to a community college, but  
 21 meet certain academic standards and milestones to be  
 22 able -- to be able to have the opportunity to at  
 23 least get an associates degree. Study after study  
 24 shows the earning capability or the earning  
 25 potential just of an associate's degree is well in

Page 43

1 excess of a million dollars during their lifetime,  
 2 during their employable lifetime. It's like \$25,000  
 3 a year if you abdicate it out if their employment  
 4 lifetime until they retire. We thought it was  
 5 important enough to make that investment.  
 6 The idea this came out of the committee,  
 7 I'm not going to fault any of my colleagues who got  
 8 suckered into that idea because none of them were  
 9 here when we did it. So you had no idea what it  
 10 was, what we agreed to, what the parameters were.  
 11 In my mind take that idea you have, just chalk it up  
 12 to experience. Let's get back to what we agreed on.  
 13 I'll volunteer just for one meeting to sit  
 14 in with you guys because I can at least bring part  
 15 of the history, right, Mr. Administrator? I was  
 16 here when Freeholder Stack -- to let my experience  
 17 and my recollection of how we started the program,  
 18 and let's see if we can come back with a  
 19 recommendation.  
 20 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: I think the bottom  
 21 line is the money.  
 22 FREEHOLDER DiDOMENICO: Also, Mr.  
 23 Chairman, just the equity from the County just  
 24 because some Freeholder didn't even know it existed.  
 25 It's being heavily used. We want to make it

Page 44

1 available to everyone.  
 2 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: That's the flaws  
 3 and fault. Look, if we create a program for all of  
 4 the school districts, and we provide the information  
 5 to all of those school districts to give out to the  
 6 students that attend their schools, and some school  
 7 districts for whatever reason don't and others do,  
 8 then us as elected officials, it's our job to make  
 9 all -- let every school district know, Hey, guys,  
 10 let everybody know in your high school that they  
 11 might be eligible for this program.  
 12 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: You had it five  
 13 years.  
 14 FREEHOLDER CIFELLI: I believe there  
 15 was an earlier system where college will vet the  
 16 applications, and then we as individuals Members of  
 17 the Board would be taken out of the formula as far  
 18 as who gets selected. That lies again within the  
 19 purview of the professionals at the college. There  
 20 is no way without getting into any privacy matters  
 21 is there a way that we as a Board could sift through  
 22 each of the top hundred candidates or top 50  
 23 candidates. We would know who they are and what  
 24 districts they come from.  
 25 So Freeholder DiDomenico's proposal where

1 two come from each district, I understand the logic,  
 2 I understand the rationale that she wants to have or  
 3 the committee wanted to have some kind of district  
 4 equity for the scholarships. I tend to think that  
 5 if you weigh the district against the equity of  
 6 most, that will disserve the student. You have to  
 7 lie in favor of the best student, irrespective of  
 8 where they may live.  
 9 But you know, I'll use the word, politics  
 10 being politics, there is always that suspicion,

 20 MR. ANTUN: Freeholder, what it was  
 21 is a form. The student would have to consent to  
 22 have that information disclosed to the Board.  
 23 FREEHOLDER CIFELLI: My concern is  
 24 that, I understand that balance that Freeholder  
 25 DiDomenico is concerned about. I share her

1 concerns. In order for us to police that, we have  
2 to say, gee, you know, what a coincidence that 17  
3 are from Freeholder O'Dea's district and none are  
4 coming out of mine. We have an opportunity to look

19 This is how the question started to raise because  
20 nobody was on the watch.  
21 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: That's up to the  
22 college. Look, go one step back here. This is a  
23 real important step. This program should never be  
24 about picking 20, 20 best, 30 best, 50 best. This  
25 program had a noble goal. I've got to be honest

1 with you. If the college came to us and we followed  
2 this with the fervor that we have slowly but surely  
3 developed the summer youth employment program, we  
4 were now up well over a hundred, Director Lopez, how  
5 many individuals, 120, the summer youth program?

25 one year's report and moved on and figured it was

 13 anyone present to address the Board on any matter of  
 14 public interest. Please remember to limit your  
 15 comments to five minutes. Are there any speakers?  
 16 MS. YENGO: Good evening. My name is  
 17 Suzy Yengo. I am a lifelong resident of Jersey City  
 18 and Hudson County and a Trustee of the Hudson County  
 19 Bar Association, and I'm here tonight to just speak  
 20 about the Earth Works Project in Lincoln Park West.  
 21 I've been in constant contact over the  
 22 past week, four weeks, with the Hudson County  
 23 Improvement Authority. I have copied Freeholder  
 24 O'Dea and several other people regarding this  
 25 communication. I have finally received a copy after

Page 66

1 four weeks of the contract with the Hudson County  
 2 Improvement Authority and Persistent Construction,  
 3 and my remaining questions, which have yet to be  
 4 answered are, what the procedure is for getting  
 5 material approved for the work site. Understanding  
 6 now the history of the work site, there is material  
 7 needed, and there has been an interruption of  
 8 service at this work site because there has not been  
 9 enough material provided.

10 I'm here today just to make a record that  
 11 Persistent Construction and Anthony Grano refused to  
 12 return to calls and my e-mails, and there have been  
 13 several regarding whether or not they would receive  
 14 material on behalf of my client, JY Industries.

15 Persistent Construction has been  
 16 sanctioned by a contract with Hudson County  
 17 Improvement Authority. At the very least, I believe  
 18 that Persistent Construction should be answering me.  
 19 They refused to answer me. I have called the office  
 20 and Mr. Grano's secretary apologizes profusely and  
 21 says she had tried to get him to answer my calls,  
 22 and he will not.

23 Simply stated, I need to know if  
 24 there's materials yet to be needed at this work  
 25 site, and if so, what the material qualifications

Page 67

1 are so that contractors who are Hudson County  
 2 contractors can make a bid to provide material for  
 3 this work site. Again, I'm here today just to make  
 4 a record that Anthony Grano and Persistent  
 5 Construction refuses to answer any bids.

6 It seems to me there might be something  
 7 going on and a reason why they are making this  
 8 decision unilaterally, and I don't believe that a  
 9 contractor in a public contract should have the  
 10 ability to ignore Hudson County and Jersey City  
 11 vendors who are trying to provide material for the  
 12 site. Thank you.

13 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: Mr. Chairman, is  
 14 there a representative from the Improvement  
 15 Authority here?

16 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Mr. Maldonado, come  
 17 to the mic.

18 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: I'm going to  
 19 request a copy of -- I'm going to ask for three  
 20 things, a copy of all, I guess you can do it in a  
 21 spreadsheet as opposed to providing me all the bills  
 22 of lading for all the materials that have been  
 23 received there. I want a listing of all the  
 24 materials that have been delivered there, who were  
 25 they, where did they originate, and who was the

Page 68

1 entity that bought those materials to the site.  
 2 That's the first thing that I want to know.

3 Secondly, pursuant to Article 18 on page  
 4 15 of the contract, letter C, events of default by  
 5 contractor, failure of contractor -- I'm sorry, this  
 6 is B. Failure of contractor to use best efforts to  
 7 supply the project with an adequate amount of  
 8 requisite fill materials. An adequate amount is  
 9 defined as approximately 30,000 cubic yards of fill  
 10 materials every two weeks or a lesser amount, only  
 11 if approved by the HCIA.

12 I want verification that this aspect of  
 13 the contract has been complied with throughout the  
 14 period of the contract. If it wasn't, I want a  
 15 written verification that the Hudson County  
 16 Improvement Authority allowed the contractor to  
 17 provide less than the 30,000 cubic yards per two  
 18 weeks. If they didn't, then I want a written  
 19 explanation as to why they didn't take the action  
 20 that they should have, which is move to default the  
 21 contract on the agreement.

22 Third, I want to find out how much, if  
 23 any, additional material is needed at the site. We  
 24 seemingly talked about this on Tuesday, but nobody  
 25 came and answered. They said we don't know, I'm not

Page 69

1 sure, we'll find out. I have to be honest with you.  
 2 I find it hard to believe that the agency whose job  
 3 it is to monitor how much material has been  
 4 delivered there wouldn't know, A, how much material  
 5 is delivered there to date; B, simply asked the  
 6 contractor how much contracts they've signed with  
 7 other entities or haulers to deliver material. In  
 8 my mind that's a question that probably shouldn't  
 9 take more than a day to get an answer to, but  
 10 obviously, the attorney hasn't been able to get  
 11 anything close to an answer. It seems that the  
 12 Authority themselves doesn't know the answer to  
 13 that, which kind of totally boggles my mind.

14 Lastly, I think that since this is a  
 15 public project, and since quite frankly, there have  
 16 been questions raised about the project, and we know  
 17 that law enforcement agencies have seized records  
 18 related to the project and the materials, I think it  
 19 is -- I think is a reasonable request for this Board  
 20 to get a written document from the contractor  
 21 explaining to us what are their policies and  
 22 procedures as it relates to how they entertain  
 23 proposals from contractors or from haulers who have  
 24 materials and how they determine what materials or  
 25 what haulers to accept materials from, and what ones

1 not to accept materials from.  
 2 Why in my mind that is the most important  
 3 question I have is because the original contractor  
 4 had a date upon which the materials needed to be  
 5 provided by. Not only was that dated important, but  
 6 if you read it, the Improvement Authority thought it  
 7 was so important that those materials be delivered  
 8 by a certain date, that they were going to give the  
 9 vendor \$3,000 per day for every day before the  
 10 contract ran out if they got the materials.  
 11 So what boggles my mind about what was  
 12 presented to me the other day is we were told why  
 13 the contract was extended and extended, the economy,  
 14 jobs slowed up. I heard more excuses from the  
 15 Agency without having the contractor here. What I  
 16 never understood was if we thought it was critical,  
 17 critical at the time this agreement was entered into  
 18 to give a bonus to the contractor if they were able  
 19 to get the materials ahead of schedule, why didn't  
 20 we put in a penalty if they failed to get the  
 21 material in on time?  
 22 Because now that I read the contract, the  
 23 point that I had made the other day about how in  
 24 construction contracts we put liquidated damage  
 25 clauses in, and Mr. Guerra said, this is not a

1 construction contract, but you know what? This  
 2 agreement proves my point. Because the Authority  
 3 said, and I'm going to pull the bid because it  
 4 appears the bid says that early delivery of  
 5 material. That's what they represented to the  
 6 public. This thing has gotten two extensions, I  
 7 think. And I think lastly, Mr. Maldonado, I want to  
 8 know a record of every vendor who reached out to the

 23 Now, years later as construction picks up,  
 24 we are in the post Sandy world where there is going  
 25 to be a lot more people out there already working,

1 bids are liable to come in higher. We're the one  
 2 that's going to be affected by that. We need to  
 3 know who they rejected and why they rejected because  
 4 it appears that the reason they wanted extensions  
 5 may be less about they could get material and more  
 6 about that they only wanted material they got at the

 8 certain amount of money or profit off of this  
 9 project. That's not good government. I want to  
 10 find out if that in fact is the case. Quite

 20 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: I think  
 21 Mr. Battista made a list, right?  
 22 MR. BATTISTA: Yes, sir.  
 23 MS. YENGO: Can I just add one quick  
 24 note? I was directed by someone in the office of  
 25 Anthony Grano from a representative that did not

1 claim that were coming from JY Industries go to  
 2 Impact Environmental for approval of the materials  
 3 being delivered. Birdsall is the contracted  
 4 engineer according to the contract that is supposed  
 5 to be accepting and approving this material and then

 24 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: So Mr. Maldonado,  
 25 add that to your list. What, you know, is the

 2 material to have that material reviewed and analyzed

 19 is this being conducted now if they have a contract,  
 20 and they're no longer in business or they're no  
 21 longer able right now to perform their duties and  
 22 responsibilities, and this is such an urgent issue  
 23 that we're dealing with, what's happening? Who is  
 24 handling this? Why hasn't anybody told us?  
 25 I mean this shouldn't apply to any current

1 contract that we have with Birdsall. I don't want  
 2 to find out that the Juneau Center, something is  
 3 delayed because of that or some other building is  
 4 delayed because of the fact that this company is no  
 5 longer able to perform their function. I certainly  
 6 don't want to have them here. I would tell you  
 7 this: Wednesday I visited the site, and Wednesday  
 8 there were trucks coming in, and they all had a  
 9 Belleville address, and Mendez was the name on the

20 MS. YENGO: According to the HCIA  
 21 just two weeks ago, Birdsall is the company that's  
 22 in charge of approving the material. So I guess  
 23 they don't know that anything has changed, and that  
 24 Anthony Grano of Persistent Construction  
 25 unilaterally has a monopoly on approving anything

1 that goes onto the site, which is not my  
 2 understanding. I thought the HCIA was overseeing  
 3 it, and they have no information for me.

4 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: Mr. Administrator,  
 5 I mean I'm going to go through these documents again

 7 better understanding. We have an agency which we  
 8 know that the federal government, FBI, seized  
 9 records related to this. There is no dispute about

 23 entity that says they have material, and no one can  
 24 even tell them what's the process and procedure, do  
 25 they need more material, how much more material they

1 have and for their best direction. It's just --  
 2 what's that gentleman's name again, Anthony?

3 MS. YENGO: Grano.

4 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: And Mr. Grano is
