 18 THE CLERK: Roll call?  
 19 CHAIRMAN MUNOZ: Please.  
 20 THE CLERK: This is L-3. Freeholder  
 21 Cifelli.  
 22 FREEHOLDER CIFELLI: Yes.

 15 present.  
 16 MS. MACK: I just want to thank  
 17 everyone. I just really want to thank my Hudson  
 18 County family. This was such a great honor for to  
 19 you do this for me. I think -- I don't know if you  
 20 saw the resolution or not. I'm retired from the  
 21 Board of Education in Jersey City after 18 years,  
 22 and for some reason you thought that was  
 23 significant.  
 24 But what I want to tell you, I think many  
 25 of you know, I've worked with many of you in

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1 different capacities, some of my proudest moments  
 2 were not only my Board of Education service, but my  
 3 service with Hudson County. What many people don't  
 4 know is I worked with Thomas Callan to set up the  
 5 TRANSCEND program before I was an employee of the  
 6 County, when I was deputy director of the  
 7 Improvement Authority.  
 8 All of those things were really wonderful  
 9 things that I did, but people keep saying, you can't  
 10 retire. Well, I ran in six election and won six  
 11 times and not many people do that in Hudson County  
 12 for a school board. But it's really time for me to  
 13 do this. I don't think many of you would know this,  
 14 but the Center for Disease Control today announced  
 15 that the new autism statistics are one in 68; one in  
 16 45 in New Jersey.  
 17 Most of you know, I went on the Jersey  
 18 City School Board when my son was a very small child  
 19 who was autistic, and he's doing wonderful. He was  
 20 honored by the Jersey City Council last night as  
 21 they declared Autism Month. The County of Hudson is  
 22 really the people who are doing Autism Awareness  
 23 Month. You're lighting up the County Schools of  
 24 Technology and County Prep next week on April 2nd,  
 25 in honor of Autism Month. So the County is always

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1 ahead of the game in doing wonderful things.  
 2 It was my intent as I go off the Jersey  
 3 City Board of Education, I went on to help my son, I  
 4 stayed to help some other kids. I think I was  
 5 success. I think that's what you're acknowledging  
 6 tonight, successful in other areas, not just Special  
 7 Ed. I want to thank you, my Hudson County family,  
 8 who are always ahead of the game, the County of  
 9 Hudson, the dedicated Freeholder Board, the County  
 10 Exec, who always care about their residents.  
 11 And so I hope we'll come before you again  
 12 so that as we move forward to help many, 500,000;  
 13 500,000 individuals who will develop autism in the  
 14 next few years. When you think about that, in  
 15 Jersey City, we have 680 students in our school  
 16 system, growing out of the school system, and we  
 17 don't have programs for them. We have programs for  
 18 the little kids, but children become adults with  
 19 autism.  
 20 I really want to thank you for your  
 21 thanking me for my service to the Jersey City Board  
 22 of Ed. I hope I'll be able to help you for all  
 23 autistic students as they becomes adults in Hudson  
 24 County. Thank you so much.  
 25 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: Seldom in all of

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1 the public school board do you see someone who has  
 2 as noble a cause for why they stood up as Sue Mack,  
 3 and she mentioned that briefly. As a mother who saw  
 4 an inequity in the system as it related to a child  
 5 with special needs, she embarked on a crusade. That  
 6 crusade, all one needs to do is meet her son, and  
 7 you will know how successful that crusade was, and  
 8 how someone who remembers Kerry as young boy, who  
 9 used to go with I'll call him my adopted son when  
 10 they were like seven years, and see that and knows  
 11 Kerry today, knows how successful that crusade was  
 12 for Sue.  
 13 When that crusade was over, Sue decided to  
 14 move on. Sue committed herself 18 years to our  
 15 Jersey City Board of Ed. She committed herself to  
 16 getting new school buildings built. She committed  
 17 herself to getting our facilities renovated and  
 18 upgraded and an entire litany of programs and things  
 19 that she did. There is no one in the state of New  
 20 Jersey who will surpass her in the knowledge of  
 21 school board issues, especially when it related to  
 22 special needs and facilities, how to build them, how  
 23 to renovate, how to upgrade facilities.  
 24 Sometimes somebody started with a crusade,  
 25 that crusade turns into a career that literally

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1 impact tens of thousands of students, young people,  
 2 in the City of Jersey City, and this is just a very  
 3 small way for this Board to say thank you to her,  
 4 and I don't think ever she'll really be retired.  
 5 She just turns from one crusade onto another  
 6 crusade, and every crusade that she turns on is one  
 7 I'm always ready to enlist her to help out.  
 8 FREEHOLDER DiDOMENICO: I want to  
 9 take the opportunity to congratulate thank you for  
 10 your years on the Board of Education, which myself  
 11 was very near and dear to my heart, serving as many  
 12 years as you did, and helping the thousands of  
 13 children in the Jersey City school system, and all  
 14 your years of planning and helping the County in so  
 15 many different ways.  
 16 I really thank you for your service, and I  
 17 know it's been a lifelong one so far, but now that  
 18 you've retired from the Board of Education, you'll  
 19 have more time to devote other endeavors. Thank you  
 20 so much.  
 21 FREEHOLDER ROMANO: I thank you for  
 22 being a board member, and thank you for your  
 23 dedication. When I heard about you on the Board, I  
 24 heard about your knowledge and experience and  
 25 honesty, which did not go unnoticed, and again, your

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1 cause was a noble one, and it has caught the  
 2 attention of this Board. Thank you.  
 3 FREEHOLDER MALDONADO: I just want to  
 4 thank Sue for her years of dedication to the Jersey  
 5 City children and school system. I too was proud to  
 6 go on dates with the kids, with Kerry and Bill's  
 7 godson when they were growing up, and I saw the  
 8 impact that Susan's crusade had on her son and had  
 9 on all the children in our school system.  
 10 So I thank you for your years of dedicated  
 11 service. I know that you're not going anywhere. I  
 12 know that you will be there, and like Bill said, any  
 13 endeavors that you partake in and that I can be of  
 14 service, you know that I'm always here.  
 15 FREEHOLDER DUBLIN: I also want to  
 16 thank you, Sue. I served with Sue Mack when I was  
 17 on the school board from 2004 to 2008, and also,  
 18 when my son was diagnosed with diabetes, she made  
 19 sure that he had the necessary services. I think  
 20 that this is a well-deserved retirement from the  
 21 board, but I know your work is not finished yet.  
 22 You're going to continue working and anything that I  
 23 can do to help you in the future, please give me a  
 24 call.  
 25 MS. MACK: Thank you.

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1 CHAIRMAN MUNOZ: Susan, on behalf of  
 2 the Board of Freeholders, I have to tell you that  
 3 you are a true fighter for the people of Jersey City  
 4 and Hudson County, and I knew about you before I was  
 5 a Freeholder because I used to read about you in the  
 6 newspapers, all the stuff you were doing, and some  
 7 of the stuff you did inspired me back then, and  
 8 you're going to continue to do your stuff and  
 9 working for the people. You are a true fighter of  
 10 the people.  
 11 When you say "retirement," when you have  
 12 that bug of serving your community and doing what  
 13 you do, I don't think you will ever retire. That  
 14 stays with you forever. You may be taking a  
 15 vacation, but I know you're going to come back, and  
 16 I seeing you fighting. So on behalf of the Board,  
 17 thank you for the service you have done for the  
 18 community, for Jersey City and Hudson County.  
 19 MS. MACK: Thank you.  
 20 CHAIRMAN MUNOZ: Thank you.  
 21 Mr. Clerk.  
 22 THE CLERK: The next order of  
 23 business is additional discussion on today's agenda.  
 24 MR. ANTUN: Mr. Chairman.  
 25 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: In regard to 17,

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1 we met in committee today to discuss this issue of  
 2 the extra duty officers that we are required to pay  
 3 for under that grant. We had asked for someone from  
 4 the Sheriff's office to be there. No one from  
 5 Sheriff's Office came. Is anyone from the Sheriff's  
 6 Department here now? For the record no one from the  
 7 Sheriff's Department was at the meeting.  
 8 I mean we raised the issue. We understand  
 9 that we're required to pay for those extra-duty  
 10 officers. The issue of concern that we have was in  
 11 reviewing the time assignments. We had identified  
 12 that there is a seven a.m. to nine a.m. shift  
 13 assignment for extra-duty officers. We asked what  
 14 is the minimum amount of hours that an extra-duty  
 15 officers is paid for. We were told four hours. We  
 16 don't know why they only have a two-hour shift. We  
 17 pay for a four-hour shift.  
 18 We were told potentially officers will  
 19 take the four-hour shift, which raises more  
 20 questions in our mind, so while we don't want to at  
 21 this point in time delay the job, we want to reduce  
 22 this amount, compel the Sheriff come to the next  
 23 caucus meeting personally, not with a  
 24 representative, he's the elected constitutional  
 25 officer, and resolve this issue. Our concern is

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1 we're spending taxpayer dollars to pay someone four  
2 hours, we want them to work four hours, and if we  
3 don't have within our department individuals that  
4 are willing to work four-hour shifts as we're  
5 mandated they get paid for, we have the ability to  
6 go into municipalities and let the municipalities  
7 find the extra-duty officers to provide the traffic  
8 control and traffic directions at the location.  
9       So I make a motion that we amend the  
10 amount from three hundred to one hundred, and that  
11 we do three things, one, that; two, that we send a  
12 letter to the Sheriff immediately asking him that  
13 any of these extra-duty shifts that are less than  
14 four hours that we're paying for four hours be  
15 extended to four hours; and the last thing, that he  
16 come to the next Freeholder meeting -- caucus  
17 meeting, excuse me, to explain to us this entire  
18 situation.  
19       CHAIRMAN MUNOZ: The motion is by  
20 Freeholder O'Dea. Second by Freeholder Dublin. I  
21 have to say as the Chairman of the Board, and as a  
22 representative of the people of District 7, I am  
23 highly offended that we had a meeting today, and we  
24 asked the Sheriff's department to come here to  
25 answer some questions we had, valid questions about

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1 money that we're spending, and the Sheriff decided  
2 not to even come to the meeting to give us the  
3 answer that we needed in order to make the right  
4 decision. I feel that it's offensive.  
5       We're really trying to cover a community  
6 with his office, and we're trying to find solutions,  
7 and we have a budget this year, which is going to  
8 have increases, and in some municipalities it's a  
9 large amount of increases. He was elected by the  
10 people of Hudson County, and he being elected by the  
11 people of Hudson County and not being able to come  
12 here, I feel that it's wrong, and I feel that he  
13 owes this Board an apology.  
14       FREEHOLDER ROMANO: Mr. Chairman, I  
15 think he's going to extend the shift to fulfill the  
16 four hours, right?  
17       FREEHOLDER O'DEA: Currently, based  
18 on the documents that we have, officers have been  
19 working seven a.m. to nine p.m., and based on what  
20 we were told, the minimum amount of extra duty is  
21 four hours, so we are paying them for four hours, we  
22 expect that they get -- that they physically are  
23 there for four hours, since that's what they get  
24 paid for.  
25       I would defer it to the mayor of the city,

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1 who initially requested it and the Sheriff to  
2 determine whether seven to nine should be six to  
3 ten, or seven to eleven based on what the traffic  
4 flow of that area is, but in my mind, it's a  
5 misappropriation of public money to pay officers for  
6 four hours, and they're only working two hours. I  
7 think that the failure of the department to have  
8 someone here today to explain and answer those  
9 questions speaks for itself.  
10       We have to pay for four hours anyway,  
11 let's have an extra law enforcement officer and  
12 extra eyes and ears out in that location directing  
13 traffic and potentially thwarting crime, being  
14 proactive. Washington Park is literally on the  
15 other side.  
16       FREEHOLDER ROMANO: Washington Park  
17 is down below.  
18       FREEHOLDER O'DEA: Right. I just  
19 think that this is a no-brainer, and it's sad to me  
20 that we've got to always delve and dig into things  
21 to get to the facts, and the facts aren't readily  
22 presented to us, and then when people think that we  
23 give people a hard time, we don't give people a hard  
24 time, we're trying to do our job. This is a glaring  
25 issue that was brought to our attention, backed up

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1 by documents provided to us that show that two-hour  
2 shift. I don't know whether or not officers are  
3 refusing to do more than two hours.  
4       FREEHOLDER ROMANO: I find that hard  
5 to believe.  
6       FREEHOLDER O'DEA: Yeah, that's kind  
7 of hard to believe. I do have a concern. I am,  
8 Mr. Administrator, I'm requested that we receive the  
9 log of all of the extra-duty officers that work the  
10 seven to nine a.m. shift, and I'm asking that your  
11 department check whether or not those officers that  
12 worked the seven a.m. to nine a.m. shift also work a  
13 regular patrol shift and whether or not there was  
14 any overlap between that extra-duty shift and what  
15 their regular assignments or patrol shift is.  
16       MR. ANTUN: Freeholder, we don't have  
17 access to that data so we don't know what the shifts  
18 are. That's done by the Sheriff's office.  
19       FREEHOLDER O'DEA: Mr. Florio, I'm  
20 asking that you request the Sheriff to provide that  
21 information to the Board and the Administration, and  
22 if that information is not provided to the Board and  
23 the Administration by the next caucus meeting, I  
24 will seek a resolution authorizing us to conduct a  
25 hearing or investigation to compel and get access to

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1 that.

2 I have no reason at this point to believe

3 the Sheriff won't provide it, but if the Sheriff

4 doesn't provide it, Mr. Administrator, at your

5 request, then obviously, we have the grounds to take

6 a further action to get access to that information.

7 It just seems bizarre to me that someone wouldn't

8 want to work a four-hour shift unless they have

9 another shift that conflicts with their ability to

10 work a four-hour shift beyond nine a.m.

11 CHAIRMAN MUNOZ: You're not taking

12 benefits, about how much has been requested to have?

13 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: It's 300,000 more.

14 Apart from to date, how much is it, Mr. Engineer?

15 MR. ARENCIBIA: About 750,000.

16 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: So to date we've

17 spent 750,000. This is reflecting an additional

18 300,000 just for that, and there are other shifts,

19 you know, that there are other questions that we had

20 today which we wanted to understand, which may be

21 very legitimate reasons why two-person patrols are

22 now four-person patrols, and two people at one end

23 of the viaduct and two people at the other end of

24 the viaduct. The problem is by not having someone

25 here to answer our questions, we can't get an

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1 explanation to understand why those changes are

2 made.

3 CHAIRMAN MUNOZ: Mr. Clerk.

4 Freeholders, any other comments? Call for it.

5 THE CLERK: Mr. Chairman, for

6 clarification the motion is to amend No. 17 from

7 300,000 to 100,000.

8 CHAIRMAN MUNOZ: For the public, this

9 is not taken out of the agenda because we don't want

10 to postpone or delay the construction that's going

11 on there. Then we would have to pay more money into

12 it, so we'll reduce the amount.

13 THE CLERK: Freeholder Cifelli.

14 FREEHOLDER CIFELLI: Yes.

15 THE CLERK: DiDomenico.

16 FREEHOLDER DiDOMENICO: Yes.

8 Mr. Chairman, one of the items on the agenda, No. 5,

9 resolution amending Resolution 737-12-2013, awarding

10 contract to Priority, we would ask the Board to make

11 a motion to withdraw this item. We've been

12 contacted by the vendor that was previously awarded

13 the contract, and we're in discussions with them,

14 and hopefully, they'll be able to provide the

15 service.

16 CHAIRMAN MUNOZ: Motion by Freeholder

17 Maldonado. Second by Freeholder DiDomenico.

18 THE CLERK: Freeholder Cifelli.

19 FREEHOLDER CIFELLI: Yes.

20 THE CLERK: DiDomenico.

21 FREEHOLDER DiDOMENICO: Yes.

22 THE CLERK: Dublin.

23 FREEHOLDER DUBLIN: Yes.

24 THE CLERK: Liggio.

11 THE CLERK: No. 5 is withdrawn.

12 MR. ANTUN: Mr. Chairman, I have no

13 additional items for the agenda, but I do have

14 additional information. I would like to provide the

15 Board with a memo from Director Fuller regarding the

16 questions that were raised by the Board regarding

17 the grants, specifically the Council on the Arts,

18 the Homeless and Families Shelter, and the Municipal

19 Alliance.

20 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: Mr. Chairman,

21 while Director Fuller comes to the podium, I'm glad

22 to see that Item 5 was withdrawn. What I'm glad is

23 that had Item 5 not been withdrawn, you ran this

24 contract April 1st to December 31st, and the

25 question that I was going to have for you today was

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1 whether or not had this resolution gone forward how  
 2 you would have addressed that by an amendment that  
 3 we previously had as it related to a 90-day period  
 4 when we switched contracts.  
 5 MR. ANTUN: This contract, the  
 6 original contract that was awarded was awarded prior  
 7 to the change, it was awarded in December. What  
 8 happened was that I was told that the vendor would  
 9 not concede, and that's what prompted this is new  
 10 process with the new requirement, but the contractor  
 11 has since contacted us and said it was a  
 12 misunderstanding up.  
 13 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: So the contractor  
 14 started in January.  
 15 MR. ANTUN: Yes, January.  
 16 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: When did that  
 17 other law get passed?  
 18 MR. BATTISTA: We have the 90-day  
 19 transition. I'm not positive, but I think that that  
 20 was only applicable to contracts where the services  
 21 are provided with County oversight.  
 22 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: Can you find that  
 23 out for the next caucus?  
 24 MR. BATTISTA: No problem.  
 25 MR. ANTUN: But I would tell you that

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1 Harvest is the --  
 2 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: No, no, I  
 3 understand that, but I'm saying --  
 4 MR. ANTUN: I see what you're  
 5 saying -- yeah, I got it.  
 6 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: I think we need to  
 7 be consciously looking at it, and I hope since  
 8 they're a company that I believe is a owned by a  
 9 minority and a woman and based in this County that  
 10 they can comply and we keep using her.  
 11 MR. ANTUN: Freeholder, that was  
 12 always our intent. What happened was we were  
 13 contacted, and then they raised an issue. Now,  
 14 since then there is seemed to be --  
 15 MR. BATTISTA: I prefer we don't. It  
 16 could end up in litigation.  
 17 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: I have no desire  
 18 to get into the details of it. I just wanted to  
 19 note for the record my preference to keeping a  
 20 Hudson-County-based, minority-owned, woman business  
 21 contract with us. I think this Board shares it. I  
 22 know County Executive Tom DeGise shares that. So if  
 23 there are ways to do that, we should.  
 24 CHAIRMAN MUNOZ: And it's located in  
 25 my district. I would like to add for minority

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1 business, we should put some kind of program  
 2 explaining to minority vendors about the resolution  
 3 that we passed relating to information that vendors  
 4 have to pay employees. The reason is, a lot of  
 5 vendors don't have attorneys on their staff. These  
 6 are start-up businesses. We have to kind of explain  
 7 to them how that applies to them and why they have  
 8 to be better informed. I think there is a lot of  
 9 miscommunication what they have to do and how they  
 10 have to do it.  
 11 MR. ANTUN: Understood, Mr. Chairman.  
 12 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: I agree. I think,  
 13 Mr. Administrator, any contract that we put out that  
 14 has the living wage and benefit requirement, there  
 15 needs to be a pre-responders or bidder conference,  
 16 and that the provisions of that law needs to be  
 17 walked through in great detail so every vendor  
 18 understands, and we don't run into a case where  
 19 somebody said, I thought I had to pay this rate, I  
 20 didn't know I had to pay X for a benefit.  
 21 THE CLERK: There are additional  
 22 items for the Board of Freeholders. Mr. Chairman,  
 23 there is a representative from Prosecutor's office  
 24 here for L-2. I wasn't aware of that earlier.  
 25 FREEHOLDER ROMANO: I had asked a

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1 question to you about representation in the  
 2 Prosecutor's office at the committee meeting. I  
 3 can't get an answer. Would you like me to ask you  
 4 now or after the presentation?  
 5 MR. ANTUN: Ask me.  
 6 FREEHOLDER ROMANO: Find out. I  
 7 couldn't get an answer.  
 8 MR. ANTUN: I want to speak you.  
 9 FREEHOLDER ROMANO: See if you can  
 10 give me an answer. It's involving up and coming  
 11 promotions.  
 12 THE CLERK: Mr. Chairman, this is  
 13 Item L-2, that was previously voted on entitled,  
 14 Resolution declaring April 6th through April 12th,  
 15 2014 Crime Victims' Rights Week: 30 years Restoring  
 16 the Balance of Justice.  
 17 MS. ATKINS: Just want to thank the  
 18 Board of Freeholders?  
 19 THE CLERK: Please state your name  
 20 for the record.  
 21 MS. ATKINS: My name is Amy Atkins,  
 22 coordinator at the Prosecutor's Office. I wanted to  
 23 take this moment to thank the Board of Freeholders  
 24 for declaring April 6 through 12 National Crime  
 25 Victims Rights Week. I am very honored to accept

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1 this on behalf the Prosecutor's Office and victims  
 2 of Hudson County. Thank you.  
 3 CHAIRMAN MUNOZ: Congratulations.  
 4 FREEHOLDER ROMANO: Congratulations  
 5 on a job well-done by the Prosecutor's office, and  
 6 Mr. Administrator, we had a question and we asked  
 7 for a representative for the Public Safety  
 8 Committee, and we wanted to talk about the proposed  
 9 promotions, and I asked for an expanded span of  
 10 control, an organizational flowchart, the supervisor  
 11 ratio to officers, because I was informed about who  
 12 was retiring, and I would like to know that detail.  
 13 Didn't we just make promotions?  
 14 MR. ANTUN: The prosecutor's office  
 15 did make promotions.  
 16 FREEHOLDER ROMANO: This is the  
 17 second batch, correct?  
 18 MR. ANTUN: I don't know what you  
 19 mean by "second batch."  
 20 FREEHOLDER ROMANO: We're supposed to  
 21 have a meeting.  
 22 THE CLERK: Mr. Chairman, is the  
 23 Administrator done?  
 24 MR. ANTUN: Yes, I am. Thank you.  
 25 Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

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1 THE CLERK: Mr. Chairman, from the  
 2 Board of Freeholders, there are four items for your  
 3 consideration. The first is a resolution  
 4 recommending that the New Jersey Legislature require  
 5 all municipal and county and state elected official  
 6 to complete ethics training. If there is a sponsor,  
 7 23.  
 8 CHAIRMAN MUNOZ: As the Freeholders  
 9 know --  
 10 THE CLERK: Mr. Chairman, is there a  
 11 second?  
 12 FREEHOLDER MALDONADO: Second.  
 13 THE CLERK: Munoz and Maldonado.  
 14 CHAIRMAN MUNOZ: As you know at the  
 15 last Freeholder meeting, I introduced a resolution  
 16 requesting that all of the employees and all members  
 17 of boards and elected officials take ethics  
 18 training. There were some issues. We cannot make  
 19 elected officials compliant with the ethics  
 20 training, so we changed the resolution to suggest  
 21 that all elected officials take the training within  
 22 one year of the resolution being passed.  
 23 With this resolution we are asking the  
 24 State of New Jersey to take into consideration  
 25 making a law that elected officials take the ethics

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1 training within a certain time of being elected.  
 2 That's basically what this is.  
 3 FREEHOLDER MALDONADO: I have a  
 4 question. I think the first Whereas, where the  
 5 Board of Chosen Freeholders may pass a resolution,  
 6 shouldn't it be "has passed" a resolution?  
 7 MR. FLORIO: It's acceptable in the  
 8 syntax in which its presented because the word "may"  
 9 suggests that the authority to do so is within the  
 10 Board, and thereby voting on it, it has happened.  
 11 So it doesn't have to be modified. If you prefer  
 12 it, say, take out that paragraph, and we're citing  
 13 to the statute, which authorizes this Board to take  
 14 the action that it's taking in voting on this  
 15 resolution. That's the enabling legislation  
 16 language.  
 17 FREEHOLDER MALDONADO: I agree with  
 18 you.  
 19 MR. FLORIO: Thank you. That made me  
 20 very happy. Thank you.  
 21 THE CLERK: That item regarding the  
 22 ethics training is 23. The items being distributed  
 23 now for your consideration will be No. 24, is a  
 24 resolution urging the promotion of telecommuting and  
 25 flexible work scheduling during the period of the

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1 Pulaski Skyway closure and urging the State of New  
 2 Jersey to expand employer-based incentives to induce  
 3 the increased use of telecommuting, mass transit,  
 4 carpooling and vanpooling.  
 5 CHAIRMAN MUNOZ: Sponsor by  
 6 Freeholder O'Dea, and second by Freeholder  
 7 Maldonado.  
 8 THE CLERK: That is No. 24. The next  
 9 item is entitled Resolution awarding professional  
 10 service contract, fair and open, outside legal  
 11 service, general counsel to the Board of  
 12 Freeholders, Edward J. Florio, Esq., of Florio &  
 13 Kenny, \$86,400.  
 14 CHAIRMAN MUNOZ: Sponsored by  
 15 Freeholder Maldonado. Second by Freeholder Dublin.  
 16 THE CLERK: That was No. 25, for the  
 17 record, Mr. Chairman.  
 18 Mr. Chairman, the next item for the Board  
 19 is a resolution awarding professional service  
 20 contract, fair and open, outside legal services,  
 21 deputy counsel to the Board of Freeholders, Law  
 22 Offices of Carmen Mendiola, Esq., \$45,600.  
 23 Sponsored by DiDomenico and Romano. That's No. 26.  
 24 And for the record, Mr. Chairman, attached  
 25 to your agenda was a replacement for 22, to show

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1 that the County Executive Thomas A. DeGise is  
 2 included in the paragraph, and that is a  
 3 replacement. It should be attached to your  
 4 original.

5 CHAIRMAN MUNOZ: Yep, it's on here.

6 THE CLERK: I have no additional  
 7 items, Mr. Chair. Call for the public portion?

8 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: Mr. Chairman, just  
 9 before you started the public session, I just wanted  
 10 to hand out to the Board copies of the proposed  
 11 action against the State of New Jersey to compel  
 12 them under the Affordable Care Act to provide and  
 13 pay for medical care for the pre-adjudicated inmates  
 14 at the Hudson County correctional facility.

15 The only thing I would add, Mr. Florio,  
 16 after having read it is I would add is, you tell  
 17 them to promulgate the rules and regulations. I  
 18 would also add that they appropriate -- that they  
 19 appropriate the funds to effectuate that. You have,  
 20 directing the State of New Jersey to promulgate the  
 21 rules and regulations pertaining to the screening,  
 22 and I would just add, appropriate any and all  
 23 necessary funding to carry, to carry this out. They  
 24 can't start doing if they don't appropriate the  
 25 money to pay for it. That's the goal we're trying

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1 to achieve. That's the goal that we're trying to  
 2 achieve related to the funding.

3 THE CLERK: According to the policy  
 4 set by the Board of Freeholders, members of the  
 5 public are asked to limit their comments to 15  
 6 minutes when discussing agenda items and five  
 7 minutes at the conclusion of the meeting when  
 8 discussing matters of public interest.

9 At this time the public may address the  
 10 Board on any item on the agenda only. Please keep  
 11 your comments limited to 15 minutes. Are there any  
 12 speakers on agenda items only?

13 CHAIRMAN MUNOZ: This is basically  
 14 any agenda item the public wants to make a comment  
 15 on. Say what number you want to talk about.

16 MR. COUGHLIN: No. 10, Joseph  
 17 Coughlin, Corrections Officer, Hudson County  
 18 Corrections. Tomorrow we're meeting with the State  
 19 PBA to discuss some of the issues that we have.

20 CHAIRMAN MUNOZ: We discussed the  
 21 issue in the Public Safety Committee today. By us  
 22 approving this today, it doesn't mean that it's  
 23 going to be a signed contract. Your union has to  
 24 sign it even if we vote on it. Counsel, interrupt  
 25 me if I'm getting out.

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1 MR. COUGHLIN: I'm asking if you  
 2 could table it for us until the next Board meeting.  
 3 We have a meeting tomorrow with the State president.

4 CHAIRMAN MUNOZ: If we were to table  
 5 it, it will be the same thing as we voted for it  
 6 because your union has to sign for it. By voting  
 7 today on this issue, we are basically giving  
 8 authorization to the Administration to sign the  
 9 contract, but if the union doesn't do it, the  
 10 contract isn't signed. That's what the vote today  
 11 means.

12 MR. COUGHLIN: The issue that we had  
 13 with the State PBA is about the contract being  
 14 signed or not signed. There are issues that  
 15 internally we have to discuss that has to be  
 16 resolved within the union. If the Board signs it,  
 17 what happens then?

18 FREEHOLDER ROMANO: The contract is  
 19 voted on.

20 CHAIRMAN MUNOZ: Let counsel speak.

21 MR. BATTISTA: I really think without  
 22 getting into any dialogue with the witness -- I mean  
 23 with the speaker, the speaker is talking about  
 24 internal union issues. The issue before this Board  
 25 is the memorandum of understanding that we

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1 negotiated with their union, their appointed  
 2 collective bargaining representative. I received an  
 3 e-mail. My Deputy County Counsel spoke to the union  
 4 counsel. The request that was made by the union  
 5 through its counsel is for this Board to consider  
 6 voting on the memorandum of understanding, voting up  
 7 and down as the Board may deem appropriate.

8 He further indicated that the vote that  
 9 was conducted at the facility was overseen by the  
 10 American Arbitration Association, and they would  
 11 wish for us to consider this matter this evening.  
 12 That was the message that my office received from  
 13 the attorney for the duly-appointed collective  
 14 bargaining representative. I would recommend to the  
 15 Board, I'll let you defer to your counsel, getting  
 16 into a dialogue with someone about internal union  
 17 issues is not appropriate, I don't believe, for the  
 18 executive branch, and I respectfully submit for the  
 19 legislative branch.

20 FREEHOLDER CIFELLI: The way I  
 21 understand the resolution coming before this Board,  
 22 the recommendation from the County Administration,  
 23 the contract from the County's perspective and the  
 24 Administration's perspective is it's a reasonable  
 25 contract for the County. This Board, my

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1 understanding is that the recommendation is the  
 2 contract was satisfactory to our meeting, and that  
 3 it's incumbent upon us in essence to vote on the  
 4 merits, and not on the substance of it.  
 5       What the speaker alluded to, he's got a  
 6 meeting tomorrow with someone from the State. I  
 7 don't know what is going on with that. That's an  
 8 internal issue among the membership. That's not for  
 9 us to consider. They have that right. All they are  
 10 asking is for us to vote yes or no. If the union  
 11 internally has problems, maybe that's unfortunate.  
 12 We can't get ourselves involved in those problems.  
 13       Again, if we vote yes, as I understand it,  
 14 it's not a done deal. The contract still has to be  
 15 signed anyway. Beyond that, I understand that there  
 16 are other procedures where it can be voided, for  
 17 example, for the internal issues. So you're asking  
 18 us to make a judgment. That's really not our  
 19 function.  
 20       MR. BATTISTA: Freeholder, I couldn't  
 21 say it better.  
 22       MR. COUGHLIN: Okay. Thank you.  
 23       THE CLERK: Additional speakers on  
 24 agenda items only? State your name.  
 25       MR. DIXON: My name is Arthur Dixon,

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1 Hudson County Department of Corrections. I'm pretty  
 2 much just wondering about pretty much what you said.  
 3 The issues that we have are internal. That process  
 4 is put in place for grievances and beyond. There's  
 5 isn't any way around it. We'll do what our State  
 6 PBA says. They have a meeting. I implore you all  
 7 to vote on the memorandum and let it be decided.  
 8       CHAIRMAN MUNOZ: Thank you.  
 9       THE CLERK: Additional speakers on  
 10 agenda items.  
 11       FREEHOLDER O'DEA: I have a question  
 12 for the director. Have we ascertained what the  
 13 total membership that was eligible on March 7th to  
 14 vote on the contract? I asked that question on  
 15 Tuesday.  
 16       MR. ANTUN: It's about 385.  
 17       FREEHOLDER O'DEA: Does anyone know  
 18 for sure? They asked at the committee meeting,  
 19 Director Aviles.  
 20       DIRECTOR AVILES: Oscar Aviles,  
 21 Department of Corrections. Freeholder, we have 371  
 22 active members.  
 23       FREEHOLDER O'DEA: So out of 371?  
 24       DIRECTOR AVILES: That's correct.  
 25       FREEHOLDER O'DEA: Mr. Administrator,

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1 can you tell us what the budgetary impact of this  
 2 agreement is on a percentage for January 13 of 2013  
 3 budget that we've already begun with, and then the  
 4 2014 budget that's yet to be introduced?  
 5       MR. ANTUN: 2013, with the step  
 6 movement, it's about 3.9 percent, in that range.  
 7 It's total of three, but on top of that, there is a  
 8 1.5-percent payment, and that is outlined in the  
 9 summary for this year.  
 10       FREEHOLDER O'DEA: That payment is a  
 11 one-time payment?  
 12       MR. ANTUN: It's a one-time payment,  
 13 that's correct, a one-time payment. This year,  
 14 there is no step movement and no additional increase  
 15 except for the top step, which would be 1.5 percent.  
 16 Again, that is outlined in the summary.  
 17       FREEHOLDER O'DEA: So the percentile  
 18 increase over two years is 3.9 percent, plus 1.5  
 19 available to the top step, something like that.  
 20 Obviously, the increase from last year is rolled  
 21 over to this year, right, is that a fair  
 22 representation?  
 23       MR. ANTUN: The increase for last  
 24 year will be charged to next year.  
 25       FREEHOLDER O'DEA: And carried over

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1 to this year?  
 2       MR. ANTUN: Yes, yeah, the impact of  
 3 the movement is reflected in this year's budget.  
 4 That's correct.  
 5       FREEHOLDER O'DEA: To give you  
 6 hypothetical, if the amount, if the amount of the  
 7 salaries is \$10 million, and you've got 3.9 percent,  
 8 then the amount of salaries for last year would be  
 9 \$10,390,000, and then amount would 10,390,000 for  
 10 this year?  
 11       MR. ANTUN: That's right.  
 12       FREEHOLDER O'DEA: And then you add  
 13 onto that, which I believe, how many, Director  
 14 Aviles, how many officers are at the top step?  
 15       DIRECTOR AVILES: Oscar Aviles,  
 16 Department of Corrections. Freeholder, I don't have  
 17 that number, but I would say roughly about 30,  
 18 40 percent.  
 19       FREEHOLDER O'DEA: So then in  
 20 additional to that, 50 percent approximately of the  
 21 officers would get a 1.5 percent one-time amount,  
 22 last year and this year, not 1.5 and 1.5. Their  
 23 base, so the salary at the top step is, and anybody  
 24 can shout out the top salary?  
 25       DIRECTOR AVILES: About 86,000.

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1 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: So 180 officers at  
 2 86,000 will get an additional one and a half percent  
 3 added onto that, which is \$1,230. So that would be  
 4 consistent with both years added into the budget?  
 5 MR. ANTUN: That's correct.  
 6 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: In that particular  
 7 instance, you would get an overall amount of  
 8 5.4 percent -- not 5.4. With only half of the  
 9 officers impacted, you probably get an overall  
 10 impact of about 4.6 or 7 percent for last year, and  
 11 it would be the same for this year. It would be 4.6  
 12 or 7, and the same 4.6 or 7. Is that an accurate  
 13 representation?  
 14 MR. ANTUN: It's over the two-year  
 15 period.  
 16 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: Oh, it's not 4.6  
 17 plus 4.6, it's 4.6 paid out in year one, carried  
 18 over into year two?  
 19 MR. ANTUN: That's correct.  
 20 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: Which is higher  
 21 than what's under the current interest arbitration  
 22 award an arbitrator would be allowed to award, would  
 23 that be an accurate representation?  
 24 MR. ANTUN: Not quite. If this was  
 25 to go to interest arbitration, the interest

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1 arbitrator would not award for the two percent, but  
 2 it depends on the span or period that you're talking  
 3 about. If it's a five-year contract, he would be --  
 4 he or she would be bound to ten percent over five  
 5 years. If it's a -- if it's a three-year deal, it  
 6 would be bound for two percent, for the six percent.  
 7 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: So an arbitrator  
 8 could theoretically argue a three-to-five-year  
 9 arbitrations.  
 10 MR. ANTUN: From what I have seen, it  
 11 would be three.  
 12 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: Let's use three.  
 13 The arbitrator would be bound to award no more than  
 14 six percent for the three-year period of the  
 15 contract. That six percent could be awarded all  
 16 over the first year. Have you seen that in any of  
 17 your awards?  
 18 MR. ANTUN: I've seen it I think in  
 19 the Sheriff's case it was three. It was  
 20 front-loaded for the first year, and then in the  
 21 subsequent years, it was less.  
 22 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: So if the cost of  
 23 the first year was six, the arbitrator would have no  
 24 choice but to do zeros under the law, which is set  
 25 to expire next week, correct?

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1 MR. ANTUN: April 1st.  
 2 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: Can the  
 3 Legislature enact it today?  
 4 MR. ANTUN: Yes, I think it was  
 5 conditionally vetoed.  
 6 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: So the legislature  
 7 had enacted it.  
 8 MR. ANTUN: Yes.  
 9 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: The Governor  
 10 conditionally vetoed it?  
 11 MR. ANTUN: Yes.  
 12 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: So either the  
 13 Legislature will do one of three things: Override  
 14 the conditional veto, they have that authority,  
 15 correct? I believe they have the ability uphold the  
 16 conditional veto, correct?  
 17 MR. ANTUN: Yes.  
 18 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: Or they can do  
 19 absolutely nothing, in which case on March 31st, the  
 20 law expires, and that's the third option.  
 21 MR. ANTUN: They can also enact the  
 22 recommendations of the Governor.  
 23 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: That's what I  
 24 said, they uphold. They would uphold the Governor's  
 25 conditional veto, that's one of the three options.

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1 MR. ANTUN: I think one of the  
 2 Houses, I memory is I think one of the Houses did.  
 3 The Senate, I believe, enacted the recommendations  
 4 of the Governor's conditional veto. I don't think  
 5 the Assembly has.  
 6 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: If the Assembly  
 7 failed to do that by March 31st, then the interest  
 8 arbitration cap would be done away with.  
 9 MR. ANTUN: Going forward but I  
 10 understand --  
 11 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: Absolutely, going  
 12 forward. But as it relates to this contract, it was  
 13 a period of time prior to April 1st of 2014.  
 14 MR. ANTUN: That's correct.  
 15 THE CLERK: Mr. Chairman, the consent  
 16 agenda now reflects the following: No. 5 is  
 17 withdrawn; No. 17 amended; Nos. 23, 24, 25 and 26  
 18 were added. Is there a motion to approve all items?  
 19 CHAIRMAN MUNOZ: Is there no more  
 20 people who wish to speak?  
 21 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: So anymore members  
 22 of the public who wishes to address any item on the  
 23 agenda?  
 24 THE CLERK: Motion by Freeholder  
 25 Maldonado. Second by Freeholder Liggio.

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1 Freeholder Cifelli.  
2 FREEHOLDER CIFELLI: Yes.  
3 THE CLERK: DiDomenico.  
4 FREEHOLDER DiDOMENICO: Yes.  
5 THE CLERK: Dublin.  
6 FREEHOLDER DUBLIN: Yes.  
7 THE CLERK: Liggio.  
8 FREEHOLDER LIGGIO: Yes.  
9 THE CLERK: Maldonado.  
10 FREEHOLDER MALDONADO: Yes.  
11 THE CLERK: O'Dea.  
12 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: No on 15. Aye on  
13 the rest.  
14 THE CLERK: Rivas.  
15 FREEHOLDER RIVAS: Aye on all.  
16 THE CLERK: Romano.  
17 FREEHOLDER ROMANO: Yes.  
18 THE CLERK: Chairman Munoz.  
19 CHAIRMAN MUNOZ: Yes.  
20 THE CLERK: All items are approved.  
21 We have one ordinance for introduction. It's  
22 entitled An ordinance amending Chapter 200, Article  
23 27, of the Administrative Code to establish traffic  
24 calming devices, delineators and edge lines, on a  
25 portion of John F. Kennedy Boulevard in Jersey City,

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1 a County-owned roadway.  
2 Freeholder Cifelli.  
3 FREEHOLDER CIFELLI: Yes.  
4 THE CLERK: DiDomenico.  
5 FREEHOLDER DiDOMENICO: Yes.  
6 THE CLERK: Dublin.  
7 FREEHOLDER DUBLIN: Yes.  
8 THE CLERK: Liggio.  
9 FREEHOLDER LIGGIO: Yes.  
10 THE CLERK: Maldonado.  
11 FREEHOLDER MALDONADO: Yes.  
12 THE CLERK: O'Dea.  
13 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: Yes.  
14 THE CLERK: Rivas.  
15 FREEHOLDER RIVAS: Yes.  
16 THE CLERK: Romano.  
17 FREEHOLDER ROMANO: Yes.  
18 THE CLERK: Chairman Munoz.  
19 CHAIRMAN MUNOZ: Yes.  
20 THE CLERK: We have one ordinance for  
21 second reading. It's entitled An ordinance amending  
22 Chapter 200, Article 18, of the Administrative Code  
23 to regulate bus stops on Willow Avenue in the City  
24 of Hoboken.  
25 This is the time fixed for public hearing

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1 on this Ordinance, which was introduced at the  
2 meeting of March 13th, 2014, advertised as required  
3 by law together with the notice of Hearing for this  
4 time. It has been posted on the Freeholder's  
5 Bulletin Board and made available to the general  
6 public.  
7 Are there any speakers on this ordinance?  
8 There appear to be none. Motion to close by  
9 Maldonado. Second by Liggio. All in favor,  
10 opposed?  
11 (The Board votes unanimously to close  
12 the Hearing.)  
13 The Hearing is closed.  
14 On final adoption, Freeholder Cifelli.  
15 FREEHOLDER CIFELLI: Yes.  
16 THE CLERK: DiDomenico.  
17 FREEHOLDER DiDOMENICO: Yes.  
18 THE CLERK: Dublin.  
19 FREEHOLDER DUBLIN: Yes.  
20 THE CLERK: Liggio.  
21 FREEHOLDER LIGGIO: Yes.  
22 THE CLERK: Maldonado.  
23 FREEHOLDER MALDONADO: Yes.  
24 THE CLERK: O'Dea.  
25 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: Yes.

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1 THE CLERK: Rivas.  
2 FREEHOLDER RIVAS: Yes.  
3 THE CLERK: Romano.  
4 FREEHOLDER ROMANO: Yes.  
5 THE CLERK: Chairman Munoz.  
6 CHAIRMAN MUNOZ: Yes.  
7 THE CLERK: That concludes the items  
8 of business on today's agenda. Are there any  
9 comments from the Freeholders on the business of the  
10 Board?  
11 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: Just quickly on  
12 Item No. 10, I have to say that I walked into the  
13 meeting with an open mind of looking to carry this  
14 item to the next agenda. However, I was  
15 anticipating and expecting a number of officers were  
16 going to speak with specific issues that they raised  
17 or may have had in relationship to how the vote was  
18 conducted or that the individuals were not afforded  
19 a right to vote.  
20 And having not been provided any  
21 compelling information on that, I felt that, you  
22 know, I at that point concurred with what Freeholder  
23 Cifelli had presented. This item was presented to  
24 us as negotiated in good faith. If ultimately  
25 subsequent to this, evidence is presented to the

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1 State PBA, that results in an invalidation of the  
 2 vote, we were told in committee that the contract  
 3 will not be executed first by us. It will have to  
 4 be executed first by the PBA local side.  
 5 I just wanted for the record to note that  
 6 I kind walked in here not hoping, but wondering  
 7 whether some information that I had received, that  
 8 there may have been more of a record created as it  
 9 related to issues related to the election. That was  
 10 not presented.  
 11 FREEHOLDER ROMANO: Yes, and I would  
 12 like to thank counsel for explaining that to us.  
 13 Freeholder Cifelli said that one line. As a PBA  
 14 member, I've called my PBA representative. The one  
 15 important thing here is that the Administration  
 16 explained, that two people have to sign that  
 17 contract. That if there is bound to be internal  
 18 discussions and consequences, that would void the  
 19 contract. So that gave some understanding to where  
 20 our jurisdiction lies.  
 21 In reference to the other issues, Mr.  
 22 Administrator, you're going to call about my  
 23 question. I would like to know what's the  
 24 organization and the hierarchy chart that we're  
 25 asked as to Freeholders to ponder. What is the span

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1 of control?  
 2 MR. ANTUN: You're speaking of the  
 3 Prosecutor's office?  
 4 FREEHOLDER ROMANO: Right. The span  
 5 of control with regard to up and coming promotions  
 6 that we just want to get an idea what the span of  
 7 control is, and if promotions are necessary, then  
 8 explain to us what that's about. Obviously, if a  
 9 position needs to be filled, they have to be filled.  
 10 If there is a controlling ratio, but there is no  
 11 organizational boundaries of supervisors, just  
 12 explain to us why. Thank you.  
 13 CHAIRMAN MUNOZ: Freeholder  
 14 Maldonado.  
 15 FREEHOLDER MALDONADO: To go back to  
 16 the request by Freeholder Romano to be able to get a  
 17 chart as to the demographics and to supervisory  
 18 positions, I would like to be able to see that.  
 19 MR. ANTUN: Freeholder, is that the  
 20 entire or just the investigators?  
 21 FREEHOLDER MALDONADO: You know, the  
 22 entire office. And if can, I wanted to make an  
 23 announcement about the middle school program for  
 24 Hudson County and the School of Technology. They  
 25 yesterday had a health fair that the eighth graders

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1 presented. The students did a muscular  
 2 presentation, skeletal presentation, digestive  
 3 presentation, and they did a great job. I was  
 4 really impressed with the quality of their work they  
 5 did, and to top it off, it was conducted in a health  
 6 fair atmosphere, and I think a lot of times we don't  
 7 expect kids of that age doing that kind of quality  
 8 of work. We should recognize that because they did  
 9 an excellent job. Thank you.  
 10 CHAIRMAN MUNOZ: Thank you,  
 11 Freeholder. Any other comments? I would to  
 12 congratulate Freeholder DiDomenico for the  
 13 presentation for Women's History Month. You did a  
 14 tremendous job and Congratulations.  
 15 FREEHOLDER DiDOMENICO: Thank you.  
 16 FREEHOLDER MALDONADO: There was a  
 17 study doe by Robert Wood Johnson that ranked  
 18 counties throughout the country and the state of New  
 19 Jersey. Hudson County ranked in the state of New  
 20 Jersey out of 21 counties was ranked No. 16 in terms  
 21 of health issues. So I think that shows as a  
 22 County, we need to do more in that particular area.  
 23 I would like to say that's something that  
 24 Freeholder O'Dea mentioned a couple meetings ago  
 25 with reference to health and human services. We

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1 should make it a point to address the aspect of  
 2 health because being 16 out of 21 is not a good  
 3 situation. Thank you.  
 4 FREEHOLDER DiDOMENICO: Mr. Chairman,  
 5 I'd like to thank Bill LaRosa at the Office of  
 6 Cultural Affairs for the Woman's History Month  
 7 presentation, and director Michelle Richardson and  
 8 County Clerk, Barbara Netchert. It was a well-done  
 9 presentation.  
 10 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: Mr. Chairman, I  
 11 asked the Administration on Tuesday for two lists.  
 12 MR. ANTUN: Freeholder, I didn't  
 13 forget. You should have it by the next meeting.  
 14 CHAIRMAN MUNOZ: Just to let  
 15 Freeholders know, we've sending e-mails to all the  
 16 clerks in all the municipalities. As I mentioned  
 17 before, I wanted to bring some of the discussion to  
 18 the different townships around the County to make  
 19 sure that, you know, we inform the people, and we  
 20 hear what the people have to say about the budget.  
 21 As of now, we have a response from three  
 22 towns, Kearny, Kearny, we've got Secaucus and  
 23 Hoboken. What we are trying to do is we're trying  
 24 to organize this. One idea I had is holding it at  
 25 the community college because the community college

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1 is located in between North Bergen and Union City  
 2 and West New York. So that kind of brings in North  
 3 Hudson. The only issue that we have is parking. We  
 4 asked the question. We haven't got any answers  
 5 back; is that correct?  
 6 THE CLERK: Only four municipalities  
 7 have responded.  
 8 CHAIRMAN MUNOZ: So can we also send  
 9 e-mails to the community college seeing if we could  
 10 do. One responded no. One of the municipalities  
 11 responded no. The community college works.  
 12 Okay. So now continue the meeting.  
 13 THE CLERK: Any comments from the  
 14 Chief of Staff to the County Executive?  
 15 MR. GAUGHAN: No, thank you.  
 16 THE CLERK: This is the time for  
 17 anyone present to address the Board on any matter of  
 18 public interest. Please remember to limit your  
 19 comments to five minutes.  
 20 Mr. John Hallanan.  
 21 MR. HALLANAN: Good evening. John  
 22 Hallanan, vice president of the Lincoln Association.  
 23 I just want to bring everybody up to speed with some  
 24 of the things that we're starting of historical  
 25 interest. First would be the Lincoln Association

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1 will celebrate its 150th years of existence next  
 2 year. That's the first organization that honors  
 3 Abraham Lincoln in the country and in the world. We  
 4 do have communication from Lincoln groups from  
 5 Bangladesh of all places. It's worldwide. The  
 6 Jersey City Lincoln Association, it's more or less  
 7 local now, but we will be expanding it. Hopefully,  
 8 they'll have a gala in the year 2015.  
 9 Second of all is the Lincoln Highway  
 10 Association. Last year, we had the centennial  
 11 celebration from Pershing Road up to the Boulevard,  
 12 left turn at Lincoln Park, out to San Francisco, and  
 13 through the efforts of Bill LaRosa and the County  
 14 Freeholders, that route was marked with Lincoln  
 15 Highway signs. I have seen them on different  
 16 streets along the boulevard, and Journal Square,  
 17 you'll see them, and at Lincoln Park, you'll see  
 18 one.  
 19 So the Lincoln Highway Association has  
 20 sort of like a lull in its activities through the  
 21 year 2016. We thought we may get a conference.  
 22 They have one every year. It seems New Jersey is  
 23 really the starting point. It starts in New York,  
 24 and it starts in New Jersey. We're trying to get a  
 25 conference of the people who belong to the Lincoln

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1 Highway Association.  
 2 We're also going to try to market the  
 3 Lincoln Highway, highlighting some businesses on its  
 4 route, including the turn onto Lincoln Highway, such  
 5 as the Loew's, which is on the Lincoln Highway; St.  
 6 Peter's University, which is on the Lincoln Highway;  
 7 advertising brochures on the Lincoln Highway. It  
 8 may generate some interest. Who knows where that  
 9 would go?  
 10 Number three is the Morris Canal, and we  
 11 had a group last year go through Morris Canal, where  
 12 it was located in Jersey City. I was at a  
 13 conference today out in Morris County. Pieces and  
 14 bits of it are being opened up and backfilled with  
 15 water, and they're reconstructing. Nothing happened  
 16 or has happened yet in Jersey City. It is possible  
 17 to walk on the Morris Canal bed near Danforth  
 18 Avenue. That bed is still there. It's been filled  
 19 in, but you can walk on it. Some people have an  
 20 interest in doing that.  
 21 Now, at that conference, somebody from the  
 22 State said something about tourism. People come to  
 23 visit New Jersey, and most of the time, they go to  
 24 stay with friends and relatives. If they have no  
 25 place in Jersey City or anyplace in the County, they

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1 will take them to New York. The real reason is that  
 2 people in this area do not know what we have as far  
 3 as historical interest. We are going to try to use  
 4 the print media, maybe Facebook, to generate some  
 5 interest in the local community. For instance, the  
 6 statue of Jackie Robinson in the Square would be of  
 7 interest, and that's not publicized anywhere, the  
 8 Apple Tree House, and there are a few other things  
 9 that we would like to publicize.  
 10 Let me see. Number four would be the  
 11 350th anniversary of the State of New Jersey,  
 12 October 18th. There would be, I guess, a  
 13 demonstration or presentation NJCU at the student  
 14 union building. Bill LaRosa himself started it. In  
 15 fact, he even gave us a name, Hudson County History  
 16 Advocates. That is a committee that is putting this  
 17 stuff together at this time.  
 18 That will be October 18th, NJCU. We are  
 19 working on speakers, for some people to be keynote  
 20 speakers. Other organizations will be invited to  
 21 set up a table and tell everybody that's coming  
 22 through what their particular specialty is. There  
 23 will be free parking. There will be a cafeteria.  
 24 We will keep you apprized of anything else happening  
 25 on that. Thank you.

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1 CHAIRMAN MUNOZ: We are running now  
 2 with Bill LaRosa's office a tourist web site.  
 3 MR. HALLANAN: Yeah, they have it.  
 4 CHAIRMAN MUNOZ: Perhaps some of  
 5 these historic places can be highlighted on the web  
 6 site.  
 7 MR. LaROSA: Bill LaRosa, the Office  
 8 of Heritage and Cultural Affairs. We do have a link  
 9 which includes the Jackie Robinson statue, and  
 10 places that are accessible to the public. Some  
 11 places are not. The buffaloes in the park, those  
 12 are all there. Thank you.  
 13 FREEHOLDER MALDONADO: That's a  
 14 disgrace and embarrassment that shows ineptitude of  
 15 the County to rectify that. The only other thing,  
 16 there's that piece of the Berlin Wall sitting there  
 17 somewhere for seven years. We haven't found  
 18 anywhere to put the Berlin Wall for seven years.  
 19 Those are two thing that show ineptness when you  
 20 can't do simple things like that.  
 21 FREEHOLDER ROMANO: Maybe in front of  
 22 your headquarters.  
 23 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: John, what was the  
 24 first capitol of New Jersey?  
 25 MR. HALLANAN: Perth Amboy.

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1 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: I think it may be  
 2 Elizabeth. There is big event this Saturday  
 3 reenacting a lot of events from 350 years.  
 4 CHAIRMAN MUNOZ: Continue, Mr. Clerk.  
 5 MR. FLORIO: Any additional speakers  
 6 or any matter of public interest. Please state your  
 7 name at the microphone.  
 8 MR. PABLO: Jose Pablo of Union City,  
 9 Central Avenue. I have a question, Mr. Chairman. I  
 10 know the County spent a lot of money putting the  
 11 bridge on Kennedy Boulevard and 32nd Street, and one  
 12 of the problems with residents in the area is, while  
 13 it was a nice job, there's a continuous problem with  
 14 the elevator. You have to go up the stairs because  
 15 the elevation isn't working.  
 16 It's something that concerns everyone in  
 17 that area because that bridge was put up as a safety  
 18 reason. It was almost impossible for the seniors to  
 19 cross Kennedy Boulevard with all traffic there. We  
 20 need to address that issue. I don't know what  
 21 Freeholder Rivas is doing about that because he's  
 22 supposed to represent Union City. I don't even know  
 23 if he's aware of that.  
 24 CHAIRMAN MUNOZ: Do we have any  
 25 documents for repairs from the elevator?

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1 MR. ANTUN: Freeholder, I don't think  
 2 that job has been closed out. There have been  
 3 issues with the elevator. It's been reported to the  
 4 contractor, and perhaps the County Engineer may  
 5 address it, and whenever we're informed that the  
 6 elevator is down, we do respond to it, but sometimes  
 7 we're not always there. Someone needs to from the  
 8 County Engineer.  
 9 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: Demetrio, can you  
 10 respond to what level of frequency you have gotten  
 11 complaints concerning that elevator not functioning,  
 12 and then next question is, if you haven't closed out  
 13 the project, do you have issues with the contract?  
 14 MR. ARENCIBIA: Demetrio Arencibia,  
 15 County Engineer. The project is still not closed  
 16 out, and all the work is finished. We are in the  
 17 process of closing it out with the State DOT. They  
 18 have to do the final inspection. We have had  
 19 complaints about the elevators, and for a time, the  
 20 contractor was repairing it, and now we've, the  
 21 County, has accepted the project, we have our own  
 22 vendor, who is the County's elevator vendor, who  
 23 would be ordered to repair it. There has to be a  
 24 trouble report generated for that.  
 25 CHAIRMAN MUNOZ: Don't we have a

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1 department for someone to inspect it, and we can  
 2 send someone?  
 3 MR. ARENCIBIA: Yes, we have an  
 4 elevator contractor.  
 5 CHAIRMAN MUNOZ: Make sure that  
 6 everything is okay. For example, the elevator, and  
 7 there is garbage on the bridge. People throw  
 8 garbage on the floor. We have to make sure we clean  
 9 all the area and make it nice. We spent a lot of  
 10 money on this bridge. We want to make sure it  
 11 services the community and works the way it's  
 12 supposed to.  
 13 MR. ARENCIBIA: I'll find out for  
 14 you, but believe there is someone going out daily to  
 15 clean the trash. They can check the elevator.  
 16 CHAIRMAN MUNOZ: Yeah, check the  
 17 elevator to make sure that everything works. What  
 18 frequency do we inspect those elevators?  
 19 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: Has the elevator  
 20 been inspected by the State and signed off on?  
 21 MR. ARENCIBIA: Yes.  
 22 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: So Mr. Barry,  
 23 speaking to Freeholder Rivas, you need to get this  
 24 Board a report at the next meeting from the vendor,  
 25 who has got the contract for the maintenance and

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1 repairs of all the elevators telling us exactly why  
 2 there is a chronic problem with operation of the  
 3 elevator. It's not enough to go fix it every time  
 4 there is a problem. You have to find out what is  
 5 wrong with it and correct whatever it is so we don't  
 6 have to go fix it every a couple of days or every  
 7 week. So have them provide a written report to the  
 8 Board and to the Public Resources Committee so we  
 9 understand what that magnitude of this issue is.  
 10 CHAIRMAN MUNOZ: We had some issues  
 11 with construction and cars taking down the fence,  
 12 correct?  
 13 MR. ARENCIBIA: Right. We installed  
 14 bollards in the corners to prevent them from hitting  
 15 the fence. They still hit the bollards.  
 16 THE CLERK: Mr. Chairman, five  
 17 minutes have elapsed.  
 18 MR. PABLO: My five minutes was  
 19 obviously taken up by the discussion. That is the  
 20 main concern. My aunt crosses there. She's 74  
 21 years old, and it's difficult because once in a  
 22 while she wants to go down to the ShopRite, and  
 23 she's not able to do it because the elevator is not  
 24 working, and it's more than one time. It's an  
 25 ongoing problem. I appreciate Freeholder O'Dea's

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1 comment that what is the root of the problem. Why  
 2 should we continue to have chronic problems?  
 3 CHAIRMAN MUNOZ: Freeholder O'Dea is  
 4 the Chairman of the Public Resource Committee. So  
 5 he will make sure that he knows, and he'll get the  
 6 report.  
 7 MR. PABLO: I would like to know what  
 8 Freeholder Rivas is doing about it since he  
 9 represents Union City.  
 10 CHAIRMAN MUNOZ: Freeholder Rivas is  
 11 not a member of the committee.  
 12 MR. PABLO: He's a Freeholder  
 13 representing District 6, the City of Union City. I  
 14 would like to know what he has done about the  
 15 problem. I'm asking you. I would like to ask you  
 16 what his role is in the project.  
 17 CHAIRMAN MUNOZ: And I know that you  
 18 want to have the debate.  
 19 MR. PABLO: We're not talking  
 20 politics here.  
 21 CHAIRMAN MUNOZ: I don't mean that  
 22 debate. You brought a valid issue in front of the  
 23 Freeholder Board. That issue has been addressed.  
 24 MR. PABLO: It's been addressed, but  
 25 it's an ongoing problems with all due respect, Mr.

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1 Chairman.  
 2 CHAIRMAN MUNOZ: Well, we're going to  
 3 get more answers. We have the question coming to  
 4 the committee. Then we get those answers, we will  
 5 make sure when we get those answers, someone will  
 6 contact you.  
 7 MR. PABLO: I would like to get a  
 8 copy from the committee. There obviously is a  
 9 problem, and with all due respect, Mr. Chairman,  
 10 it's something that's not politics. It's a reality.  
 11 Why wait until someone gets hurt because they can't  
 12 cross with the elevator, and a 74-year-old woman  
 13 cannot go up the stairs?  
 14 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: Leave your address  
 15 with the Clerk. When I receive a copy of the  
 16 report, I consider it a public document, I'll ask  
 17 that the Clerk send a copy of that.  
 18 MR. PABLO: I'll be glad to do that.  
 19 THE CLERK: Additional speakers on  
 20 any matter of public interest?  
 21 FREEHOLDER MALDONADO: Motion to  
 22 adjourn.  
 23 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: Second. All in  
 24 favor.  
 25 (Whereupon the proceeding is then

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1 concluded at 7:49 p.m.)
