 11 present. Whereas, American women of every race,
 12 class and ethnic background have made historic
 13 contributions to the growth and strength of our
 14 nation in countless recorded and unrecorded was; and
 15 Whereas, American women have played and
 16 continue to play a critical economic, cultural and
 17 social role in every sphere of the life the Nation,
 18 and American women were particularly important in
 19 the establishment of early charitable, philanthropic
 20 and cultural institutions in our Nation; and
 21 Whereas, the Senate and House of
 22 Representatives of the United States America have
 23 designated March as "Women's History Month;" and
 24 Whereas, Hudson County is commemorating
 25 the 2013 National Woman's History Month theme, Women

 18 the City Chief Architect; in 1984, Helena Ruman
 19 opened her office for the practice of architecture
 20 and engineering; for over 30 years she has been the
 21 architect of record for the restoration of the
 22 Justice William Brennan Courthouse; since 2004, all
 23 projects have been based on her Preservation Plan
 24 for the Courthouse; for more than a decade, Helena
 25 Ruman was the first and only woman in the State of

1 New Jersey who obtained professional licenses in
 2 both architecture and civil engineering; Helena
 3 Ruman received several awards for her work including
 4 an Honor Award from the State of New Jersey Society
 5 of Municipal Engineers, and an Excellence Award from

 7 Now, therefore, be it resolved by the
 8 Hudson County Board of Chosen Freeholder as follows:

 11 reported in her short biography, Ms. Ruman really
 12 made a very large impact in this area in
 13 architecture and engineering.
 14 And I think probably so many things about
 15 it impressed me, and it's always a pleasure, the
 16 County's collaboration with you, but the fact that
 17 you were the first woman in the state of New Jersey,
 18 you held this for ten years, to dual professional
 19 licenses in civil engineer and architecture is very
 20 impressive. We're going to present to you as we did
 21 on the evening of Women's History Month with a medal
 22 and proclamation from the County Executive, the
 23 Freeholder Board and Congressman Payne.
 24 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Continue,
 25 Mr. Clerk.

 17 removing the words "retardation" or "feeble-minded"
 18 and replacing them intellectual disability or
 19 developmental disability in all New Jersey State
 20 laws and regulations; and
 21 Whereas, it is time to address the slur
 22 "retarded" and raise the consciousness of society to
 23 its hurtful effects; and
 24 Whereas, people cognizant of this problem
 25 around the world are taking a stand and raising

1 awareness of the dehumanizing and hurtful effects of
 2 the "R-word" and they are encouraging others to
 3 think of this painful stereotype of people with
 4 intellectual and developmental disabilities; and
 5 Whereas, Spread the Word to End the Word
 6 campaign is an ongoing effort by Special Olympics,
 7 Best Buddies International and their supporters to
 8 raise the consciousness of society about the
 9 dehumanizing and hurtful effects of the word
 10 "retarded" and encouraged people to pledge to stop
 11 using the "R-word;" and
 12 Whereas, the campaign, created by youth
 13 with and without development disabilities is
 14 intended to engage schools, organizations and
 15 communities to rally and pledge their support at
 16 www.r-word.org.
 17 Now, therefore, be it resolved by the
 18 Hudson County Board of Chosen Freeholders that:
 19 1. It hereby recognizes March 2013 as
 20 "Spread the Word to End the Word" Month in Hudson
 21 County;
 22 2. It encourages people across Hudson
 23 County to cease using the "R-word," helping to make
 24 the County a more accepting place for all people;
 25 and

 2 to Office of Governor Chris Christie, the Office of

 20 March as Developmental Disability Awareness Month.
 21 This has been a campaign for a few years to have
 22 people become more conscientious of the language
 23 that they use.
 24 Most people don't realize it, but the
 25 terms idiot, imbecile and moron were actually term

1 in the 1900s, an actual medical classification.
 2 They were used to connote people's IQ scores. As
 3 you know since most people don't realize that and
 4 know them as insults and slurs, the same thing has
 5 come with the label "retardation" which was thought
 6 to replace that. Across the United States, we're
 7 looking to replace that word with intellectual
 8 disability because it has become demeaning and
 9 insulting.
 10 This campaign is asking not only to change
 11 and language and legislation and formal document,
 12 but for people to become more conscientious that
 13 when they use language like that even in a casual
 14 way, it's hurtful to people through no fault of
 15 their own who have intellectual disabilities, and
 16 its' hurtful to their families. I'm my colleagues
 17 to support this along with me.
 18 THE CLERK: Freeholder Cifelli, do
 19 you wish to be recorded on L-1 and L3?
 20 FREEHOLDER CIFELLI: Yes on both.
 21 THE CLERK: The next item is L-4,
 22 observing the month of March as Developmental
 23 Disability Awareness Month.
 24 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Freeholder
 25 DiDomenico sponsors. The Board as a whole seconded.

 25 Medical Center agreed that they would -- they would

 2 one of the breaks to come and give me a presentation
 3 how they're proposing to reuse Greenville Hospital.
 4 They did not come back as it related to that, and
 5 they -- nor did they provide any of the contracts.
 6 We asked for Mr. Yesin's contract, and we asked for
 7 Mr. Scott's contract.
 8 I'm now asking that the Board formally
 9 file a written request to get those contracts,
 10 copies of those contracts for our information. They
 11 said they were going to give them to us. We haven't
 12 gotten them. It's a month. It doesn't take more
 13 than a few minutes to make a photocopy. They're
 14 obviously stonewalling us. They're not willing to
 15 provide us that information. They are public
 16 members appointed to that board. I want to research
 17 whether, in fact, we have a legal right to it or any
 18 citizen has a legal right to it under OPRA. That's
 19 one thing I want to know because that may relate to
 20 other documents that we have.
 21 But obviously as a major entity that has
 22 contracts with that facility, we are entitled to
 23 have that information. I don't know what that
 24 gentleman is looking to hide, but I think of it as
 25 an affront to us as elected official to not provide

 16 I'm here to report on the second break, not the
 17 first break.
 18 On the second break, that break occurred
 19 near the construction of the viaduct, and that is
 20 currently in the process of being restored, but for
 21 the Board's information, that break did not occur as
 22 a result of our contractor. What was happening is
 23 that Public Service had to open up that area, and
 24 Public Service's subcontractor was the one who was
 25 on-site, and unfortunately, they did not have

1 accurate information from United Water when they
 2 were opening up the ground so.
 3 But OEM did respond with potable water. I
 4 know Director Demellier's office was also there, and
 5 I believe that most of Hoboken will have water
 6 restored within the next couple of hours.
 7 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: I want to take the
 8 opportunity to thank Jimmy Woods and his staff at
 9 OEM for their quick response in the community as
 10 well as Director Demellier, who was on the phone
 11 bright and early with Chief of Staff Gaughan. We
 12 appreciate the response. Obviously, with all the
 13 construction going on the area, it compounded the
 14 situation. Again, thank you all for your quick
 15 response and your concern and everything you did.
 16 Freeholder O'Dea.
 17 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: Mr. Chairman, two
 18 issues. The first issue, Mr. Administrator,
 19 Director Demellier spoke to me briefly before the
 20 caucus. Can I ask him or someone on the record to
 21 just give me an update on the lighting at Lincoln
 22 Park Synthetic Field 10 and 11? I saw a flurry of
 23 e-mails this morning that we've even engaged the CEO
 24 of PSE&G. You saw that, right? He responded right
 25 away. Kudos to PSE&G. The president and CEO got

 3 Director Demellier was the one who alerted me to
 4 this issue so that I figured once I got people

 14 as we're meeting, we're waiting for the field crew
 15 to actually physically turn on the electricity at
 16 the poles. We hope that will be the end of the
 17 project, that the lights will come on.
 18 If the lights for some reason do not come
 19 on after power is turned onto the control panel, the
 20 only thing left would be underground cable from that
 21 panel to the lights, and the contractor has been put
 22 on notice that if there is further problems, it
 23 would require a wire, new wire from the panel to the
 24 lights. That will be done over the weekend. That
 25 will not be pushed off until next week. We have a

 2 various organizations in that part of that City. We
 3 don't expect a problem past the power being turned
 4 off this afternoon, but if it is, we have
 5 contingencies in place.

 23 FREEHOLDER RIVERA: Yeah, I don't
 24 know what one has to do with the other, but on this
 25 extension to a particular important service that

1 we're providing to our inmates in the case of an
 2 emergency. I don't see why we should be penalizing
 3 someone in this particular situation because of the
 4 other issues that we have with the Medical Center.
 5 Let's not penalize the community that we're serving

 18 provided him with the document, and he sits on the
 19 board.

20 They actually canceled the meeting so they
 21 didn't even have to discuss the item. How can we
 22 believe they're negotiating in good faith with
 23 unions when they don't even do that? All we did
 24 today, Members of this Board abstained in protest to
 25 that, and one of the Members, and I think other

23 a management that disrespects the union, that isn't
24 willing to even have a 60 or 90-day cooling off
25 period to try to see if issues can be worked out,

1 then he walks out of this meeting and walks out of
2 the City Council, who unanimously took the same
3 position we did. The Mayor of the City took it. We
4 all stand together on it. Irregardless where we may

 11 and we have started reconnecting families back
 12 together. When a woman comes out of prison, she
 13 gets the necessary help; when a man comes out of
 14 prison, he gets the necessary help, and from that
 15 you can put them back into the household and start
 16 reconnecting families. I just want to thank
 17 everybody that played a part in making this happen.
 18 Thank you.
 19 THE CLERK: This is the time for
 20 anyone present to address the Board for any matter
 21 of public interest. Please remember to limit your
 22 comments to five minutes. We have cards filled out.
 23 The first card was from Ms. Lidya Radin.
 24 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: While we're
 25 waiting, Undersheriff Conti, thank you for the egg

1 hunt in Columbus Park. The Sheriff's officers were
 2 there and interacted well for a huge crowd of
 3 parents and children. Thank you.
 4 FREEHOLDER DUBLIN: While we're
 5 waiting for the speaker, we have to discuss the May
 6 7th and May 9th Freeholder meeting because I'm going
 7 to try to.
 8 THE CLERK: We can do that. Please
 9 state your name.
 10 MS. RADIN: My name is Lidya Radin.
 11 I used to live at 278 3rd Street in Jersey City. I
 12 hadn't expected to speak today but Pauline Roman
 13 asked me to speak for her because she is delayed.
 14 Her purpose in coming to the Freeholders -- am I
 15 talking too fast? Is to put facts on the record
 16 because who she's really speaking to is the State
 17 Attorney General, and I'm videotaping to make sure
 18 that the transcript isn't changed.
 19 So before I get to the remarks that she
 20 would like the Freeholders know just as an aside,
 21 you do have another little piece of leverage against
 22 the Medical Center, the Jersey City Medical Center,
 23 that acts in an objectionist way and that seeks to
 24 take advantage of innocent people like me, and that
 25 little piece of leverage is the criminal prosecution

1 that I'm pushing and was fought in my case. You're
 2 not alone in this. I'm going to add my little piece
 3 to that also. And I had meeting with Joseph Scott,
 4 and he blew me off too. I also went to over his
 5 head to Chairman Regal, but that's incidental. We
 6 will get to that.

7 The reason why I'm here is because Pauline
 8 Roman is having a problem that City Councilwoman
 9 Viola Richardson is making good faith efforts to
 10 help her with, and she has the same problem with
 11 Municipal Court Judge Babcock that I had. After the

 13 Municipal Court Judge Frank Babcock and asked for
 14 help. He did nothing to help me. Pauline Roman

 19 Pauline Roman's case pro bona. He never should have
 20 done that. He has a conflict of interest, and
 21 according to the Pauline Roman, the Jersey City
 22 Municipal Prosecutor's office specifically, Mark
 23 Curtis her known about the conditions in her
 24 basement for the last four years, and her -- the
 25 conditions, the deplorable conditions in her

1 basement was in the photographs that were taken by
 2 the Jersey Journal. She's going to bring them. I'm
 3 sure one of you have seen.

4 FREEHOLDER O'DEA: What's the
 5 address? What address does she reside at?

6 MS. RADIN: 150 Pearsall. And Viola
 7 Richardson has called the Health Department, asked
 8 the Health Inspector to come down. There is a
 9 broken pipe in her basement. This is not due to the
 10 damage to property. This is because the landlord
 11 refuses to make the proper repairs. The building is
 12 decaying. He's a slum lord, not a landlord. There
 13 is a broken pipe that spewing raw, untreated human
 14 feces into her basement, and I made a few phone
 15 calls yesterday.

16 Within a half an hour, I found the most
 17 effective solutions. This landlord is spending more
 18 money on an attorney to come into court with a
 19 presiding judge, Marybeth Rogers, to create a false
 20 court record, when, for a fraction of what he's
 21 spending on legal fees to assign blame to everybody
 22 else, blame the City, blame the tenants, blame Lidya
 23 Radin, blame everybody why he couldn't fix a broken
 24 pipe in his basement? He should take personal
 25 responsibility for his building and get it fixed.

1 So what she wants you know is that Frank
 2 Babcock had a conflict of interest. He's been
 3 covering up for the Jersey City Municipal
 4 Prosecutor, Mark Curtis who has known about the
 5 conditions for years, and he's also covering up for
 6 the City Inspector. That would be Mr. Gross. Bill
 7 or William Durrity is here with me because we were
 8 at Pauline Roman's apartment on Saturday,
 9 November 24th, 2012, when City Inspector Mr. Gross
 10 was supposed to inspect. So apparently he got his

 24 City is responsible for this.

22 considering the recent increase in the pension
23 contribution, the recent increase in the social
24 security tax. I mean, our members are now making
25 less money than they were making last year. They're

2 support our family this year then it was just last
3 year, and the step increase would only at a minimum
4 have offset the money we're making now.

21 in favor of the PBA. I mean the ruling I have here
22 is very thorough, and it cites the County violating
23 several New Jersey statutes on fair labor practice,
24 and I just at this point, why would the County go
25 out of its to way to negotiate a sunset clause in

1 other union contracts? Obviously, it exposes that
 2 they're a way out of their obligation to make
 3 incremental payments upon contract expiration.
 4 Without the clause, we get our steps.

 25 MR. ANTUN: That is correct.

 2 Sheriff's officers that we as a Board look forward
 3 and hope that is resolved with the cooperation of
 4 the legislative and administrative branches with the

2 information. It made the front page of the Jersey

25 your victim. I'm still a victim, like I said

2 Now that being said, to see the FBI come
3 into the jail, I felt like victory is mine. I am
4 standing here today with a letter from the
5 Prosecutor's office, three days after the

8 the Prosecutor's office, quote, Mr. O'Dea, we knew
9 nothing about this, okay? Evidently, I kept telling

22 don't have holidays. The County Chief of Staff said
23 to me, have a happy holiday. We don't even look
24 forward to holidays. This is mischief in the making
25 and the Administrator and this Board don't even take

1 a good faith effort. Three PBA presidents alive, I
2 sat on your chairs and asked you nicely, look into
3 this, this girl was wrongfully terminated.
4 So it bothers me when I sit here and you
5 lie. All these people talk about negotiating

7 can't discuss that, we're being represented by
8 counsel. Lawyers are the biggest liars, no
